The weekly meeting of the Municipal Commission was held last night. Chairman Gosling and Commissioners Ayre, Peel, Morris, Mullaly and Vinnicombe were present.

After the reading and confirming of the minutes of last weekly meeting the following business was transacted.

Secretary Government Railway Commission, T. A. Hall, renewed application for permission to erect temporary building east of the railway station. The Council cannot give permission for this erection.

The Secretary of the T. A. and B. Society stated it was their intention to install a sprinkling system in connection with the Theatre flat of their building and asked the necessary connection with the city water mains. Request was acceded to, the Society to pay all costs of installation.

Messrs. Morey & Co. and A. E. Hickman & Co., made application for the placing of hydrants and guaranteed for watering purposes, and guaranteed the costs of installing same. Work will be undertaken under the usual conditions.

A letter was read from Mr. J. M. Tobin regarding demand for taxes on athletic sports recently held.

A communication was received from Inspector General Hutchings in relation to the application recently made by Marshall's Garage to install a gasoline tank at their station, West End. Permission will be given to erect the tank but supply pipes will not be permitted to be located at the Water St. Curb.

Solicitor Carter reported on lands New Found Pond which the Council intends expropriating.

Regulations in reference to the putting of houses in habitable condition were submitted so as to amend those at present in force.

Communication from K. R. Prowse regarding demand made in connection with costs of improving lands of McLean's and Walbank's estates was referred to the solicitor.

Solicitors Blackwood, Emerson and Winter forwarded a communication in reference to property of E. Power, Duckworth St.

Application of Fleischman Yeast Co. to install electric motor on their premises was granted subject to the supervision of the City Engineer.

City Garage requested share of work in repairing motor trucks, etc.

A. L. Reid asked compensation for loss of horse. The solicitor is to be asked to report as to the Council's liability.

J. F. Miller requested water supply residence Cornwall Ave. The Engineer was instructed to report for next meeting.

A letter was read from H. A. Anderson regarding proposed monument to be erected foot Garrison Hill. E. N. White asked that attention be given light, South Side. This matter has already been reported to the Electric Light Co.

W. B. Power asked permission to build carpenter's shop, Collier's Lane, off Forest Road. The matter was ordered deferred until next meeting.

Report of Health Officer showed 8 cases of Diphtheria, 2 Scarlet fever and 2 Typhoid fever in the city during the past week.

Reports of Inspector Rooney and City Engineer were read.

With the granting of requisitions for the various departments, the disposal of routine matter and the passing of pay rolls and bills presented, the meeting adjourned at 11 o'clock.

**Next Sunday's Service
at Gower Street.**

The Committee of management of Gower Street Sunday School have decided on holding their regular anniversary service on Sunday, December 5th.

The Committee have extended to Rev. Elijah C. French the invitation to preach the anniversary sermons at both morning and evening services. Mr. French's well-known reputation as a Sunday School enthusiast leaves no doubt but that all those who will be fortunate to hear him, will be well repaid.

The afternoon mass gathering of the Sunday School will be held in the auditorium of the church. The Hon. R. K. Bishop has kindly consented to act as Chairman. Mr. Bishop has for some years relinquished active connection with the Sunday School, but is still interested in the work carried on in this department of the church. The Sunday School Scholars and Teachers are looking forward to Mr. Bishop's address with considerable interest.

Rev. Mr. French will also deliver an address on Sunday School work at this service while it is also hoped to have present on that occasion the venerable Dr. Cowperthwaite, as Gower St. Sunday School wishes to take this opportunity of extending to this venerable gentleman their hearty congratulations on having passed another milestone, during the present week. In addition to the regular anniversary sermon in the evening, the subject of which will be announced later the Choir has consented to assist the Sunday School with special music, and Mr. Lloyd Woods will render a solo.

During morning and evening services, scholars and teachers will occupy the galleries, while the parents and friends will be given seats in the auditorium of the church. At the afternoon service the position will be reversed, scholars occupying the main auditorium, while the galleries will be thrown open to visitors and friends.

It is also understood that Rev. Forbes has expressed a wish to relieve Mr. French of his preaching appointment at Blackhead, and will be leaving town on Saturday to take up this work. The friends at Blackhead will appreciate having the Pastor from old Gower Street preach to them on the coming Sunday.

It is admitted now in official Government circles that some form of increased taxation must be imposed this winter, as the revenue is entirely inadequate to cover the expenditure of the Squires-Coaker Government. Direct taxation in some form is hinted at.

The public news says that Labrador fish is being sold for \$8 in St. John's now, "this price having been forced by Mr. Coaker." Somehow we have a hunch that the price was "forced" by the fishermen themselves in their meeting of Thursday week.

In spite of Mr. Coaker's S.O.S. for delegates from every Council, it does not appear to have had the effect he had hoped. It is really a pity, though, that some strong spokesmen could not have attended and told the President a thing or two about the Fish Regulations and the Sugar Scandal.

When the coal fighters on the s.s. Lingan, at Clarendville, struck for an increase of pay over 30 cents, the Chairman of the Railway Commis-

sion, W. F. Coaker (one time champion, self-styled, of the underdogs, but now the friend of Reids and the "Graballs") ordered a squad of police to the scene. Did anyone say "Cornwall"?
