CHAPTER III.—GOING ASHORE.

The ship on which the eye of Malvina Blantyre fell as he paused for a moment on the height to glance over the wide expanse of ocean which lay beneath was a large packet ship from Liverpool to one of the Waterford harbours. Under the freshening breeze which had sprung up towards the close of the afternoon, the vessel scudded briskly up the Channel with all her sails set, though every minute the captain, who paced the deck and looked with uneasy glances at the flying clouds aloft, thought he must give orders to reef and shorten.

On the centre of the deck, round the mast, was an enormous pile of packages—bales, boxes, and parcels of all sizes and shapes, barrels, trusses, hampers, and an assemblage of miscellaneous articles, such as a packet ship usually carries for her upper cargo. The other parts of the deck were full of bustle and animation, for, in anticipation of a squall, all hands had been piped up and the crew were actively engaged in loosening ropes, lashing spars, and securing the rolling deck furniture.

A few passengers lounged here and there, holding on by the shrouds, and gazing with interest at the mountainous coast which lay along their lee, on which the shadows of evening were already beginning to fall.

At the stern quarter stood a youth of gentlemanly mien, well muffled up. His travelling cap was drawn so far over his head, that an observer could not get a full view of his features; but these were obviously prepossessing. His countenance was fresh and ruddy; his features were cast in the type of manly beauty; and he had a large open sparkling eye, not dark, but in harmony with his sunburnt hair, which clustered in rich luxuriance under the fur of his cap. He stood close to a small new boat, which was swung above the bulwarks, with her oars sails and ropes stowed orderly away in her bottom, ready for use. She was painted of a fresh bright green, with a broad blue stripe round the gunwale. With one hand the youth held on by the rope which swung from this little trim looking boat, his other hand being caressingly placed on the head of a magnificent Newfoundland dog, which stood with his fore paws placed on the top of the bulwarks, and its head resting on the same. It was a noble animal, of a jet black colour, of massive proportions, shaggy hair, and a sagacious countenance. Its bright, speaking eye was bent not on the neighbouring shore, but on the white foam that flew from the side of the ship and lay in snowy patches upon the surface of the dark water. It was an eager gaze, and his huge frame quivered as if impatient to breast the rising billows.

At the other side of the dog, stood a man somewhat older than the youth, dressed in a suit of stout hoddie-grey. He too wore a cap on his head, but it was of plain blue cloth, and his brown rough face showed that he belonged to a humbler rank. His countenance was round and broad, and indicative of good humour. There was a quiet repose in his face, which had however a most intelligent expression, and manifested a shrewd, honest fearless character.

Some paces distant from this group stood another man by himself. He too was comparatively young, somewhere about same age as the last mentioned; and he leant against the side with his arms laid cross-wise on the bulwarks, and his face resting above them. Earnestly and with a fixed wistful gaze did he also scan the cliffs and eminences of the rocky coast. His small blue eye went from point to point with glances of tender recognition, and the sight seemed to bring up dear associations; for, as he gazed his eyes grew humid, and more than once he had to brush away with his sleeve the haze that gathered before it had time to condense into tears. This man was well dressed—had a large white and yellow handkerchief round his neck, a low crowned hat on his head, a blue coat, with brass buttons on his back, and a fine specimen of the head and face of an Irishman grew above his shoulders. He seemed an Irishman, too, in substantial circumstances, preserving all the general marks that distinguished his countrymen; but in a plummy prosperous form. He had a fat, full countenance, a free and careless figure and gesture which showed that poverty did not require him to cringe and bow to any of his fellows. The evening came on, and with it the wind increased and the sea rose, causing the ship to heave and rock upon the waters. All the passengers except those who have described, went below as twilight approached.

Last Days of Sir Archibald Alison.

The son of Sir Archibald Alison has published an account of the last few days of his father, in which we read:—"For some weeks before his last illness, my father had been troubled with an occasional cough and breathlessness, but so slight was it that it never interrupted his official business. On Friday, the 10th of May, he attended as usual in the County buildings, and appeared in the most perfect health. On the morning of Saturday, the 11th, he was seized with a severe attack of spasms in the throat. These recurred again with great severity on the evening of the Monday following, and with such terrible violence on the evening of the ensuing Thursday, that the three medical men who were in attendance on him united in opinion that in all probability he had not half an hour to live. But the great natural strength of his constitution here supervened; he rallied and the disease changed its type; the throat spasms entirely ceased, the cough and breathlessness greatly diminished, and he slept much. His strength now gradually and slowly sank, and at half-past seven on the evening of Thursday, the 23rd of May, surrounded by every member of his family, he peacefully sank to rest. So calm was his end that we could not tell the exact moment of his death."

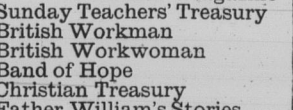
