Additional Aid to the Welling-ton, Grey and Bruce Railway.

We notice that the Hon. Mr. Crooks, on Wednesday, will bring up for the ranction of the Legislative Assembly an Order in Council grant-ing additional aid to the Wellington, Grey & Bruce Railway Company. The Order is based on a memoran-dum of the Provincial Treasurer, in dum of the Provincial Treasurer, in reference to the application of the Company for aid from the Railway Fund for that portion of the South-ern Extension of their line lying be-tween Palmerston and Wingham, which has hitherto received no aid from the Government. The Council advise that, subject to the ratification of the Order in Council by resoluof the Order in Council by resolu-tion of the Legislative Assembly, payment be authorized to be made out of the Railway Subsidy Fund to the Company of the sum of one hun-dred and ninety-four dollars and forty cents per mile for that portion of the line of the Company's railway between Palmerston and Wingham, such sum to be payable by a stran between Paimerston and Wingnam, such sum to be payable by even half yearly payments of ninety-seven dollars and twenty cents each on the 30th day of June and the 31st day of December in each and every year, ending the period of twenty years, to be computed from the first day of January, 1872, and to the full end thereof; and the Committee further advise that the said grant of aid be subject to the following condition

and be subject to the following con-ditions :--Ist. On condition that on or be-fore the first day of July next, it shall be made to appear, to the satis-faction of the Lieut.-Governor in Council, that the whole ine of rali-way between Palmerston and Kin-cardine has actually come into the possession and control of the Com-pany, and in operation by the Com-pany's servants and agents, or by those of any other Company duly authorized in that behalf by the Wellington. Grey, & Bruce Rallway Company, with all necessary and con-venient station hobres and other facilities for the conveyance of the facilities for the conveyance of the staffic of the cost trat traversed, and that the arrangements for the ope-rating of the road are such as will acour the continuance of these facilities.

2nd. On condition that His Excel-2nd. On condition that Ilis Excel-lency in Council may, on or before the said first day of July next, direct that payment be made to the said Company out of the Bailway Fund (should the same become applicable thereto) at the rate of \$:000 per imile of the said portion of the rail-way between Palmerston and Wing-lam instead of the said annual mileage rate of one hundred and ninety-four dollars and forty cents at the option of the Lieut.-Governor in Council.

It will be seen from the above that it is left to the option of the Government either to pay the yearly subsidy ment either to pay the years, or the subsidy of \$2,000 per mile in one payment. It is to be hoped that this additional aid, and the expected sanction by the Great Western flail-way Company for the issue of bonds for 151 miles of sidings, which that company has heretofore refused to give, will enable the company to pay up the claim of the contractor, so that the road may be opened for traffic, and the people along the line between Palmerston and Kincardino, who gave large bonuese to aid in its construction, may receive some value for their money. 
