THE WORK OF WOMEN'S

CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION Place in Social and Industrial Awakening

Berlin, May 20 .- The world's young women's Christian association which is holding its fourth conference here had for its general subject of discussion today "The place of the Young Women's Christian Association in the social and industrial awakening." Mis-A. M. Reynolds presided during the dis-

A summary of the subject compiled from reports made by representatives in various countries, was presented by Miss Florence Simms of the United

States. After reference to reports examined the speaker concluded:

"The association is entering into a social service where it interests itself in the questions of the workshop en-vironment of life, the home life, or the lack of it, of the multitude of commer-cial and industrial workers. It is again touching sec al service widely when it brings together the women of leisure and the women of labor where they naturally learn to know and appreciate each other and the unity of a life in Christ. What relation has the associa-tion to the industrial worker? We hav perhaps no better answer than said one eminent educator: first by placing the means of religious instruction near to them, second by studying their physical and economic requirements and the social measures, legislative and others, for helping them, and lastly by multiplying opportunities of social life without patronage and pauperising tendencies.
