BURNS BOOKS SHE CONDEMNES
IN PRESENCE OF A THOROUGHFrisco Woman Makes Public Ceremony
of a Bonfire of What She Calls
Indecent Reading of Today

San Francisco, Cal., May 19.—With ceremonial and speeches some literature was burned publicly by Mrs. Philip Verrill O'Connell the other evening, in the presence of 100 children and a few adults, she made a bonfire on the sidewalk, before her residence, 1607 Baker street, and cast thereon a collection of books which she declared, typified indecent reading of the present time.

The first book to go to the flames was "The Devil." It was dropped on the blazing logs and as the pages curled and burned the audience broke into cheers. Around the fire a group of a score of girls dressed in white, carrying green branches in their hands, waved them and sang.

"Mrs. Bovary" followed "The Devil." This novel was made the special target of Mrs. O'Connell's denunciation. It was given to the girls in the University of California by teachers of French and hoped that its circulation would be stopped.

The surprise of the evening, came when Mrs. O'Connell threw a copy of Ralph Connor's "Black Rock" on the flames.

"A mixture of depravity and religion," she said.

"The Widow and the Bachelor" by Helen Rowland; "The Prince of Illusion" by John Luther Long; "Love Letters of an Englishwoman" "Camille" and "Fables of the Elite" were added to the pyre.

THE WORK OF WOMEN'S
CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATIONIts Place in Social and Industrial
Awakening

Berlin, May 20.—The world's young women's Christian association which is holding its fourth conference here had for its general subject of discussion today "The place of the Young Women's Christian Association in the social and industrial awakening." Miss A. M. Reynolds presided during the discussion.

A summary of the subject compiled from reports made by representatives in various countries, was presented by Miss Florence Simms of the United States. After reference to reports examined the speaker concluded:

"The association is entering into a social service where it interests itself in the questions of the workshop environment of life, for home life, or the lack of it, of the multitude of commercial and industrial workers. It is again teaching social service widely when it brings together the women of leisure and the women of labor where they naturally learn to know and appreciate each other and the unity of a life in Christ. What relation has the association to the industrial workers? We have perhaps no better answer than this, said one eminent educator: first by placing the means of religious instruction near to them, second by studying their physical and economic requirements and the social measures, legislative and others, for helping them, and lastly by multiplying opportunities of social life without patronage and pauperizing tendencies.

WHEN LOVE GROWS COLD.

A Deserted Wife Makes Cynical
Definitions of Marriage and Divorce.

London, May 20.—Curious extracts were read in the divorce court from the diary of Mrs. Clara Hill, who seeks separation from Dr. John Robert Hill of Sheffield. Some of them were:

"Divorce—the only opening through which freedom can be obtained from slavery."

"Divorce—the only opening to happiness from the perfection of human misery."

"Wedlock—lying with a Gordian knot a yoke by which fools link themselves and afterwards deplore their fate."

"Marriage—an antediluvian relic, fallen of late years into disrepute, recently revised and made compulsory for obvious state reasons. Originally founded on an Old World superstition called love, but now entered upon by persons of tender conscience with the least aversion to each other."

Mrs. Hill asked for a divorce on the ground of her husband's alleged misconduct and cruelty, but he denied the charges. According to petitioner's counsel, Mr. Hill made Miss Ada Oakes's acquaintance at Sheffield, Bedford, and the couple had been seen driving together, kissing each other, and in each other's company at late hours. Miss Oakes continued counsel, had referred to the respondent as "my boy," and said she was to be married to him as soon as there was a divorce.

Wage-Workers' Symposium

PARAGRAPHIC RECORD RELATIVE TO THE TOPICS,
PROCEEDINGS, EFFORTS AND LESSONS LEARNED
BY THE WORKERS AS THEY PLAY THEIR PART
IN THE WORLD'S GREATEST MOVEMENT.

That the "Reds" in Western Canada national unionist—a man—in the face, are a factor in the organized labor movement may be true. In fact it is he who well deserves the contempt of every true of them in every portion of the member of the great international la-united industrial world. But as live a bunch as they may be the program mapped out for them by E. Obermeyer in the Hamilton Herald, exists chiefly in the minds of a few old grannies who abhor progress and are fond of attributing motives to those who seek to do things. So guilty is the conscience of these political fossils that Bro. Obermeyer has been inspired to mold their dreaded nightmare into the "Industrialist" in the September meeting of the Trades and Labor Congress at Fort William is becoming more manifest than that evinced in any previous Canadian labor gathering.

For the federal fiscal year ending March, 1910, 1514 Chinamen entered Canada. Of these 926 paid the \$500 poll tax; but 588 were exempt under the act as merchants and the wives and children of merchants. European countries according to the official figures, contributed the immigrants as follows: From Italy, 12,146; Russia, 18,731; Turkey, 775; Turkey in Asia, 600; total, 33,255. The number of importations, and immigrants, from the old country are not available at this writing. But the difficulty now experienced by the unionists in maintaining schedules or securing wage increases commensurate with the cost of living, indicates that the federal government is doing well the bidding of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association.

Vancouver park commissioners are planning to make bathing and boating at English Bay as free to all as the soft salt sea breezes of the Prince Pacific. Mostly any rational being will admit that this is as it should be. But just suggest applying the same principle to the coal mines, saw mills, canneries, telephones or other collectively owned property throughout British Columbia and watch the results. Dilations on home destruction, lack of incentive, dividing up human nature or other nonsensicalities, would be in order.

Vancouver has one of the finest natural parks in the world. It is collectively owned and used property. Thousands of dollars are being expended annually in making it more accessible, more attractive, and of more educational value to the many thousands who visit it every year. Stanley Park is not utilized for coining profits, but to satisfy the needs and requirements of every man, woman and child in Vancouver. It is kept up and beautified for the use of all, rather than for the profit of a few snobs. Thus one gets a glimpse of the possibilities and practicability of collective ownership. No sane person would ever think of permitting Stanley Park to become the property of a profit mongering corporation. And so it would be with other collectively owned, but corporately owned property if the same principle were once applied.

Winnipeg, Man., has once more been delivered of a new labor party. Physicians assert that still borns are not included in the mortality list. Hence there will probably be no more deaths to record. Experience is a cruel school, but as necessity knows no law the ultimate outcome will be much the same at elsewhere in Western Canada: wage-workers will line up under the banner of the international labor movement—the Socialist party—and proceed to use and apply their machinery to meet local conditions. If the issue must be met let's meet it now and meet it like men not apologists.

The Carpenters and Joiners of America expect the membership in good standing to reach 200,000 by June 30.

Wage-worker members of fraternal orders should be more interested in fighting for an industrial freedom they do not possess than in commemorating a liberty already won.

On May 20, Alphonse Verville, M. P., and Gustave Francey, vice president of the Trades and Labor Congress, Montreal, will sail for Europe, visiting the principal cities of Great Britain, Germany, France and Belgium. Both will be accompanied by their wives. They will return in August. In July Controller Joe Alney, of Montreal, sails in company with one of Montreal's city fathers—Eastern Labor News.
