"It is difficult to understand what can be the purpose in the minds of a man who flaunts this insolence in the face of Canada. It is equally difficult to understand what kind of people he takes. Where does anyone in Great Britain-member of parliament or addle-headed London correspondent-get the license to advise Canada to 'remain part of the Empire'? The insinuation that advice of this sort is necessary is a miserable libel. And surely a Britisher should understand the danger of addressing to another Britisher the word 'must.' hint that out ability to sell Canadian securities in the London market depends on the liberality with which we donate to the cost of naval defence, a happy one. If this is the tone which Mr. Borden's visit has taught Londoners to adopt toward Canada, then the sooner he comes home the better for good feeling, and the less talking he does on Imperial matters in future the better for the Empire. Canadians have every sincere intention of contributing their fair share toward the cost of the common defences, but they will not tolerate this kind of language from anyone. It is time that some people in London were given to understand that they have pire, and are not likely to be."
