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COMPETENT OFFICIALS SECURED FOR
THE CALGARY INDUSTRIAL EXHIBITION

Corps of Well Known Horseman Will Preside—
W.P. McNair, Presiding Judge; J. Osborn will
Start Runners, Dr Scott the Harness Events

Patrons of the races which will be held in connection with the Calgary Industrial exhibition, June 30 to July 5, will be pleased to learn that a very competent staff of officials has been secured to handle these events. From the list of entries which has been received for the races to date there is every reason to believe that there will be a better class of horses here than ever before and it is very essential that judges, starters and other officials should be thoroughly onto their job.

Arrangements have been completed with W. P. McNair, of Douglas, Arizona, to act as presiding judge at the race meetings of the Western Canada fair and racing circuit, to be held in Regina, Moose Jaw and Calgary. Mr. McNair will also act as official starter at the Swift Current meeting. Jas. Osborn, of El Paso, Texas, and assistant starter, Mr. Howard, will start the running races over the entire circuit with the exception of the meets at Saskatoon and North Battleford, where Mr. Rushon will start both harness and horse races. Dr. John Scott, of Peoria, Ill., will start the harness races over the circuit with the exception of the meets at Edmonton, Saskatoon, Prince Albert and North Battleford. R. D. Eaton of Minneapolis, will start the

harness horses at both the meetings at Edmonton. Chas. L. Trimble, of Princeton, Ill., will act as racing secretary in charge of the meetings at Calgary, Winnipeg, Brandon, Regina, Moose Jaw and Edmonton. Mr. W. H. Plant, of Saskatoon, will act as secretary of the meetings at Saskatoon.

The harness stakes which close on April 15, filled very satisfactorily. The harness early closing events closed for the Dominion exhibition at Brandon on May 15. The running early closing events for the circuit close on May 15 with the exception of the turf meeting at Saskatoon and both meetings at Regina which closed on April 15, and the meetings at Winnipeg where the running early closing events closed on May 1, the running early closing events at Brandon close on June 15. The Regina exhibition early closing events as follows, did not fill, and they have been drawn open until May 15.

Six and a half furlongs, real estate early closing event, \$1,000. Two-fifteen trot, early closing event, \$1,000. One and one-eighth mile Regina Derby, early closing event, \$1,000. The harness early closing events over the circuit have all closed with the exception of the Dominion exhibition, Brandon, which close on May 15.

WANT MORE EXPLICIT
CHALLENGE FROM
SIR T. LIPTON

New York Yacht Club Asks for
More Particulars About the
Rules for the Race for Cup

London, May 7.—The Royal Ulster Yacht club today received a letter from the New York Yacht club replying to Sir Thomas Lipton's challenge to a race with Shamrock IV, for the America cup, in which it is said that the New York Yacht club since 1902 has made radical changes in its system of measurement and time allowance and that important changes also have been made in the racing rules. The letter continues:

"Your reference, therefore, to the regulations of the last contest as governing the present challenge, leaves us uncertain whether you mean a challenge for a race sailed with or without time allowance, and if with time allowance, whether you propose to be sailed under the New York Yacht club system of measurement and time allowance and under the racing regulations of 1902, which governed the last contest, but which are not in force at the present time."

The letter concludes by asking for information on these points, "as it is essential that the committee be informed of the specific nature of the match proposed before it can take any action on the challenge."

Will Be Easily Settled
Sir Thomas Lipton said last night that he had not yet received a copy of the letter, which had been addressed by the New York Yacht club to the Royal Ulster club and on the spur of the moment was unable to answer the questions propounded. But he added: "The New York Yacht club's committee who have the matter in charge, are thorough sportsmen and are anxious for a race; I haven't the slightest doubt that the points they raise will be settled to our mutual satisfaction and the race will take place."

Rube Waddell Has Blood Poisoning.
Minneapolis, Minn., May 7.—Rube Waddell, once recognized as the greatest left-handed pitcher in baseball, is seriously ill here with blood poisoning. Waddell injured a knee in some unknown way at the ball park last week, and the wound was neglected. It was found on examination that Waddell is in a serious condition. It is feared the leg may have to be amputated.

HIBERNIAN HATREDS
Attempted Shooting in County
Clare—Fire-Eating Unionists
Rant of Reprisals

Dublin, May 8.—At 4 o'clock on Wednesday morning Mr. Richard Maunsell, a well-known agriculturist, and his son, Mr. George Maunsell, while driving from their residence, Island Magrath, County Clare, to attend a cattle fair at Ennis, were shot at from the roadside, and Richard Maunsell was wounded in the head. They had reached a point midway between Ennis and Clarecastle, when the shot was discharged within ten yards from the roadside. The shot struck Mr. Maunsell's hat and tore away the skin on the top of his head. His son pulled out a revolver and fired twice in the direction from which the shot had come, and then drove his father to a doctor, who dressed his wounds, after which he was taken home.

The outrage is condemned in the district, where Mr. Maunsell is very popular. At the sitting of the county court in Ennis, Judge Bodkin referred to the outrage and strongly condemned it.

Daring Danish Arctic Explorer
Returns From Green-
land Wilds

Copenhagen, May 7.—A message from Thorshaven, Faroe Islands, announces the success of Knud Rasmussen's Greenland expedition, which returned yesterday after a three years' absence. At Peary Land the Danish explorer found large numbers of seal and musk-oxen which pro-

vided ample supplies. Where the Peary Channel was supposed to be found a large tract of land free of ice. Game was abundant in that section, and the party halted for a month before starting on the return journey over 600 miles, which was covered at an average rate of 31 miles a day. Rasmussen depended entirely on his Eskimo outfit, and took with him no tinmed provisions.

CHICAGO, May 7.—A jury to try Jack Johnson, the negro prize fighter, charged with violation of the white slave act in transporting Belle Schreiber from Pittsburg to Chicago in 1910, was completed in Federal Judge Carpenter's court today and it was stated that counsel in the case would make their opening statements this afternoon.
