Astonishing Response from Ontario to Appeal for Red Cross Funds. Aylmer Does Nobly.

When the appeal went out from the Motherland for a contribution of \$500,000 from Ontario to the Red Cross Fund, to furnish necessities and comforts for the wounded and sick soldiers, no doubt came from any quarter that the sum would be made up. No one perhaps anticipated, however, that instead of the sum asked for, a million and a half of dollars would be the result. Such is the case, and the end is not yet, as additional contributions are daily being reported. From every corner of the province a cheerful and hearty response came, which is convincing evidence that the people are ready to respond at any time, up to the measure of their ability, even though it may mean a sacrifice.

Aylmer Gives \$2,250

The estimated share of Aylmer was placed at \$1,500, but the bustling canvassers had more than received this amount before the noon hour, and while contributions are still coming in voluntarily, the total at the time of writing has exceeded \$2,250.

The Express wishes to heartily congratulate the loyal people of Aylmer on their magnificent response. The total represents an average of more than \$1.00 for every man woman and child in Aylmer, and the best feature of the canvass was the response was general. Practically everyone gave their "bit," and they gave it so cheerfully that the work of soliciting was actually a pleasure.

There were no really large subscriptions, every one responding apparently with the idea before them that this was not the last call by any means to be made upon them. The largest individual contribution was \$40, and the next largest \$25. The "mites" prevailed and those in less fortunate circumstances all did their part, and were actually the heaviest givers.

None deserve more credit than the pupils of the public school, who emptied their little banks apparently; and handed in the grand total of \$40. In addition to this they worked like little heroes in selling the Red Cross flags donated by Mr. E. A. Miller, the proceeds amounting to \$69.44. Hats off to the public school scholars.

The High School pupils came forward with a collection of \$18.20, and the proceeds of the Star Theatre netted \$25.45. Outside of these the \$2,250 was made up entirely by personal subscription.

The canvassing committees were under the able instructions of four captains, who never found more willing and enthusiastic assistants.

Mr. W. Warnock, who is kindly acting as treasurer of the Fund, is the one upon whom the big burden of the work falls. Nothing daunted, however, he went at the work of listing and checking up, and may be depended upon to give a true account of his stewardship. Will is not only a good worker but is also a good giver.
