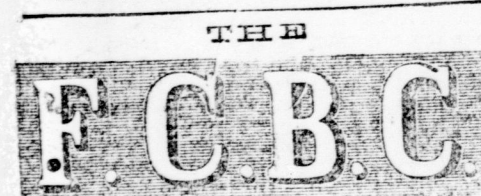

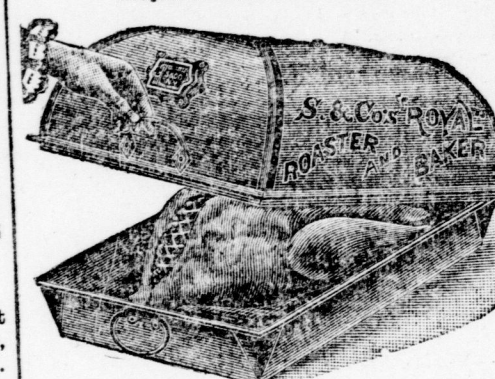

\$30,000.
