America. THE MISSIONARY DISPUTE.

Rev. Dr. Sutherland Asks for a Suspen

sion of Judgment. Dr. Sutherland, missionary secretary of the Canada Methodist Church, writes: "The publication of the letter from six of our missionaries in Japan has placed before the whole church statements seriously affecting the action and administration of myself and Dr. Macdonald. As the whole question has been, and still is, under consideration by the executive committee, and will be finally adjudicated by the general board in October, it would be manifestly improper for me, as an officer of the society,

to enter the arena of newspaper controversy, or to try to influence public opin ion on a question that is before the properly constituted court. But to prevent a grave injustice to Dr. Macdonald, by allowing one sided statements to go unchallenged, I will go so far as to say that documentary and other evidence will be placed before the general board sufficient, in my opinion, to fully vindicate Dr. Macdonald's course. As for myself, I will only say that I shall be prepared, at the proper time and place, to present such evidence as will effectually answer any impeachment of my administration, and show clearly where responsibility for the troubles in Japan properly belongs. Meanwhile, I would suggest that the only wise and safe course for the friends of our missions to pursue, is to suspend judgment until all the facts are before them, and especially to avoid further complicating the matter by a public controversy which, at present, must necessarily proceed upon one-sided and imperfect information.'
