Washington Crossing, N. J., Sept. 24.— Antonio Frazzi has been wearing a bright red handkerchief around his neck as he goes to his work in the quarries near here. On the way yesterday he met, in the wildest part of his walk, an Alderney bull. The animal saw the handkerchief and shook his head angrily. Frazzi said: "Soh! Soh! and the bull came at him, head down.

There was a hugh boulder near by and Frazzi rushed around this, the bull after him. Round and round they ran, the bull snorting and Frazzie shouting. Frazzie missed his footing and the bull had him in the air immediately, and when he came down, tossed him up again. The second toss landed him within reach of a tree. Frazzie climbed the tree, helped sot a little by the prodding horns of the bull. Seated out of reach he broke off branches and threw them. But the bull butted the trunk of the tree at intervals all day long and gave

Frazzie no chance to escape.

At sundown the bull walked away home and Frazzi descended from his perch where he had spent eleven miserable hours. Today he went to see Farmer John Krozer, who owns the bull; and showed him his bruises and scratches.

ing seven persons. DEATH OF RAWSON SHAW. London, Sept. 24.-Wm. Rawson Shaw, member of Parliament for Halifax, and successor to Isaac Butt, leader of the party which started the

home rule movement, died at Enniscorthy, age 85 years. TO WATCH RUSSIA AND FRANCE. Berlin, Sept. 24.—Baron Von Kideren-Waschter, a personal friend of the Kaiser, has been nominated German Minister at Copenhagen. This appointment is regarded as the keynote of a policy on the part of Germany to closely watch the developments of

the Russo-French entente. THE WAR IN MADAGASCAR. Paris, Sept. 24.—The French Minister of War has received a cable dispatch from Col. Bailloud, in Madagascar, asking that a fresh hospital ship be sent to the Island for the use of the troops during the coming winter. He advises against the sending of Chinese coolies, fearing the introduction of cholera, which has hitherto been unknown on the island.

MRS. MAYBRICK'S CASE. London, Sept. 24.—Baroness de Roque, mother of Mrs. Florence Maybrick, who is now at Rousau, is said to have communicated with her solicitors in regard to new and important evidence in the Maybrick case, which will be submitted to the Home Secretary, Sir Matthew White Ridley, who has promsed to review the case.

WILDE'S DEBTS IN COURT. London, Sept. 24.—In a hearing of the Oscar Wilde bankruptcy case today, counsel for Mr. Wilde stated that his debts amounted to \$3,591 and that there were no assets. Several friends, it was stated, had subscribed a sufficient sum to pay all the claims against Mr. Wilde except that of the largest creditor, who is a personal friend of he debtor. journed until Nov. 12. PLOT TO BLOW UP THE SULTAN'S

PALACE. London, Sept. 24.—The St. James' Gazette prints a dispatch from Constantinople saying that the Turkish police officials have discovered a plot among Macedonians to destroy, by the use of dynamite, the Yildiz Kiosk, the palace of the Sultan, and the Government buildings. As a result of the discovery the most extensive precautions have been taken at the Yildiz Kiosk to prevent any damage to the palace and possible injury to the Sul-

tan. GARIBALDI'S VETERANS RE-

Rome, Sept. 24.-King Humbert yesterday reviewed the Garibaldi veterans and others who took part in the wars of the independence and unification of Italy. The war veterans numbered 10,000 men and carried the colors of 200 companies or other military subdivisions Queen Margharieta, Prince of Naples and all the members of the Ministry were present. The review was witnessed by an enormous

crowd of enthusiastic spectators. A TELEPHONE NOVELTY. Berlin, Sept. 24.-The Emperor has taken a new departure in the way of communicating with his Ministers and others while absent from Berlin. While he is in Rominten he is followed whereever he goes by a telephone car, by the use of which he is enabled to speak from any point of the chase with the foresters, gamekeepers, etc., and also to keep up close communication with the Ministers and other state authorities in Berlin and elsewhere. The Emporer will return to Berlin in the early part of October, when the leaves of absence of all the Cabinet Ministers

RAVAGES OF CHOLERA IN CHINA. William E. Curtis, who is the Washington correspondent of the Chicago Record, went to Japan in May last to study the commercial and industrial prospects afforded Americans in that country, and lately he has been in China, which he describes as the pest-

breeding center of the universe.

"The cholera has attained fearful proportions in China," said Mr. Curtis. The Chinese are dying by thousands. I passed through the streets of Pekin, Shanghai and Tien Tsen, and saw cholera victims dead and dying on every hand. It is no uncommon sight to see the dead bodies of cholera victims lying on the street on one block and in the next a lot of Chinese gorging themselves with raw cucumbers and melons. The cholera is all attributable to the filthy habits of the Chinese and the weather. In Pekin they have a plan of issuing permits for the removal of bodies outside the city walls. As is probably well known, no bodies are interred within the walls. To secure permission for the removal of the remains of a deceased mortal outside the walls of the city a cash is dropped in a box. A cash is a small brass coin worth one-twentieth of one cent. At night the cash receptacle is It contains from 2,000 full. pieces of coin, and when it is con-sidered that nearly all of these deaths result from cholera the enormous extent of the disease can be readily judged. The disease is as bad at Shanghai and Tien Tsen, and is also mowing down Chinese by the hundreds in other ports of the infected country." Mr. Curtis said that the cholera is confined almost exclusively to the native Chi-
