LAKE RAFTS A SUCCESS.

ver 279,000,000 Faet Imported to Michi

gan From Canada Last Year. Saginaw, Mich., Feb. 10.—During the Deason of 1895 there was rafted from the Georgian Bay district, Canada, to Michigan sawmills, a total of 279,229,-743 feet of logs. Of this amount the Saginaw River received 167,000,000; Tawas, 40,000,000; Alpena, 20,000,000; Cheboygan, 34,019,743, and Detroit, 18,-10,000 feet. Of the logs rafted to the Saginaw River all but 25,000,000 feet were consigned to Bay City mills, the

balance to Saginaw. The average ▼alue of these logs was \$11 per 1,000. ▲ much larger number was cut in that district intended for Michigan mills, but being hung up because of low water, did not come out in time for rafting. But few logs were lost luring the season, and the results ave demonstrated that log rafting cross the lake is a success.
