LAKE RAFTS A SUCCESS.

Over 270,000,000 Feet Imported to Michigan From Canada Last Year.

Saginaw, Mich., Feb. 10.—During the season of 1895 there was rafted from the Georgian Bay district, Canada, to Michigan sawmills, a total of 279,229,742 feet of logs. Of this amount the Saginaw River received 187,000,000; Tawas, 40,000,000; Alpena, 20,000,000; Cheboygan, 34,019,743; and Detroit, 18,310,000 feet. Of the logs rafted to the Saginaw River all but 25,000,000 feet were consigned to Bay City mills, the balance to Saginaw. The average value of these logs was \$11 per 1,000. A much larger number was cut in that district intended for Michigan mills, but being hung up because of low water, did not come out in time for rafting. But few logs were lost during the season, and the results have demonstrated that log rafting across the lake is a success.

AWFUL DISCOVERY.

Hunted for Eggs in a Barn and Found the Dead Body of Her Father.

Goblesville, Mich., Feb. 10.—Mrs. Albert Allen, living four miles north of here, went to the barn to gather eggs, and was horrified to find the body of her father, Elijah Bullard. He had crawled into a loft over the stables, and evidently froze to death. Bullard had been an inmate of the Kalamazoo asylum, but was released about two years ago. He had been living in Otsego, and the first intimation of his presence in the neighborhood was the finding of his dead body.

His hat was missing. On his person was found two loaded revolvers and a blank book, in which was a certificate of deposit of \$70 in the Otsego Bank. He was lying on his face in some straw.

Middlesex Liberals

The East Riding Association Has a Rousing Meeting.

At Which Mr. John Gillson's Candidature Is Heartily Re-Indorsed.

Addresses by the Nominee, T. H. Purdom, Dr. McWilliams, J. D. Clarke, Ald. Farnell, W. E. Jackson, G. C. Gibbons, Q.C.—Election of Officers.

The members of the East Middlesex Liberal Association held a rousing meeting in the Young Liberal club rooms on Saturday afternoon. The meeting was largely attended and the enthusiasm shown by the gathering augurs well for Mr. Gillson's candidature in the forthcoming contest in the east riding. The president, Mr. Elisha Ironsides, occupied the chair, and among those present were:

W. Jackson, George Scattergood, Mark Ashman, Dr. J. H. Gardiner, James Wheaton, W. McConnell, Jas. Bell, Jas. Henderson, Chas. Treblecock, John Durand, T. H. Purdom, J. H. Elliott, Dr. McWilliams, Jas. Wheaton, jun., J. H. Shaw, John Sutherland, C. O. Stapleton, Wm. Fraser and many others.

The first business of the afternoon was the election of officers. Each office was warmly, though good-naturedly, contested, and the election resulted as follows:

Honorary President—Hon. Wilfrid Laurier.

President—Elisha Ironsides.

Vice-President—Geo. Cairncross.

Treasurer—W. F. McGuffin.

Secretary—W. H. Shaw.

Vice-President—S. B. Gorwall, London township; Jas. Wheaton, West Nisour; W. McConnell, North Dorchester; J. C. Dance, ex-M.P.P., South Dorchester; Wm. Moore, London West; C. O. Stapleton, East London; and J. H. Elliott, Westminster.

Mr. Wm. Fraser, the retiring secretary, was, on motion of Messrs. Gillson and Rogers, accorded a hearty vote of thanks for the efficient manner in which he had fulfilled the duties of his office during the year.

Dr. McWilliams then briefly addressed the meeting, and was followed by Mr. Thos. H. Purdom. Mr. Purdom noted a strong resemblance between the condition of affairs in East Middlesex and at Ottawa.

In East Middlesex the Liberals are united as at Ottawa, but the men who have hitherto supported the Conservative candidate in East Middlesex are as divided as have been, and are, the Conservative members at Ottawa.

Standing by himself, Mr. Marshall would be a weak candidate, and he (Mr. Purdom) could not see why any Patron, whether he be a Liberal or a Conservative, should remain in the battle for the purpose of increasing Mr. Marshall's chances. He thought the Patron candidate should retire in favor of the Liberal nominee and let the contest be between Mr. Marshall and Mr. Gillson. The trade policy of the Patron was identical with the position taken by Mr. Laurier.

Least of all did Liberals believe in bringing in religious issues. If people would look at those questions from a proper standpoint there was no reason why elements of strife should be stirred up by introducing religious questions. It was the height of folly.

The Conservative leaders at Ottawa had reached the same position as the tramp, in that whenever he ate anything it made him hungry. The "bolters" were evidently in that position—so anxious to get at the loaves and fishes that they could not stay out very long. If they had stayed out very much longer the Liberal party would now be in power, and there would have been another election on.

The bringing back of Sir Charles Tupper meant no good to Canada. It meant a far more reckless policy than the late chieftain would introduce or carry on. There was no doubt whatever that Mr. Charles Tupper would dare and do what Sir John A. would never have dared or done. Mr. Pur-

dom referred to the despicable means used by Sir Charles to elect himself. Undoubtedly money had been used lavishly and religious prejudices had been turned to full account by him. He pointed out that while it was clear that Sir Mackenzie Bowell did not enjoy the confidence of the party, it was by no means clear that Sir Charles Tupper did. He also referred to the feeling which had even penetrated Ottawa, and that the Liberals would be triumphantly returned at the coming election.

Mr. Purdom instanced the fact that the country was being put out at the rate of \$6,000,000 a year—half the capital of the Bank of Montreal. To meet this would necessitate increased taxation on the part of the present Government.

Ald. Farnell was also given a good reception, and he was applauded frequently during the course of a short address in which he reviewed the situation. He referred in complimentary terms to Mr. Gillson, who was a good speaker and a man who thoroughly understood the needs of the farmers.

Mr. Gillson, who was cheered on rising, mentioned the fact that he had been the nominee of the Liberal party for the east riding in 1895. In that time he had gained some experience if nothing else, and he lost nothing in point of zeal, determination or persistent will to do what he had pledged, as far as possible, to relieve the country from the burden that at present rests upon it. When he accepted the nomination he did not promise to support the Liberal party through thick and thin. He would not be the candidate of any party support it or all times. Yet the principles of the Liberal party were the principles that had blessed the Canadian people, and they could look to the development of those principles for nearly all measures that had laid the foundation upon which this country had grown. Continuing, Mr. Gillson spoke of the vain promises of the high tax party that by the year 1890 the national debt would have been reduced to \$100,000,000. They clapped on all sail at Ottawa and spent money freely, and on the contrary the debt had been increased one and a half times. In other words there was over \$250,000,000 debt resting on the country, allowing the Conservatives their own estimates of the assets. Sir Charles Tupper shut out the very lines of industry that he said he was going to advance. To Mr. Tupper was a millionaire, and what equivalent had he given the country?

Mr. Gillson proceeded to show that the Conservatives by their trade restrictions had been disloyal to Canada. He could not for one instant see why the Conservative party could support the present Administration. They had at Ottawa a Premier who said his Cabinet were his family and a Chief Minister who said the Premier was an imbecile. If either or both assertions were true, it was a disgrace to the country. He could not see how an honest man, or a true man, or a man who could serve the interests of his family could support the present despicable state of things at Ottawa.

The rascally conduct surrounding the release of McGreevy and Connolly was worthy of the times of Henry VIII. Justice had been sacrificed.

In conclusion Mr. Gillson said he would never be found betraying his trust, executing a double shuffle, or resorting to any trickery in any particular, and all he wanted was the united support of those who believed in fair, honest, progressive management of public affairs.

Mr. J. D. Clarke, who followed, took a most optimistic view of the situation. He showed how the Government's majority had been reduced one-third even while it was in power, and pointed out that the conditions were much better for the return of a Liberal in East Middlesex than they had been for several of the constituencies where Liberals had been returned in the late bye-elections by large majorities.

Mr. W. E. Jackson then rose, and was followed by Mr. Geo. C. Gibbons, Q.C., who said that by their recent actions at Ottawa the leaders of the Conservative party had only confessed what the Liberals had been thinking for some time. The time the country had been passing through had discredited and discounted their policy, and everything pointed to a change.

The following resolution was then unanimously adopted: "That this association reindorses its decision of a year ago with regard to the nomination of Mr. Gillson, and the members pledge themselves to do all in their power to elect him at the coming election."

The meeting then broke up with cheers for the Queen, Hon. Wilfrid Laurier and the candidate.
