London, April 15.—The Paris correspondent of the Times says that two submarines, the Espadon and the Silure, have carried out a successful theoretical attack on two trans-Atlantic steamships, La Bretagne and La Champagne, off Cherbourg. The captains of the liners were told that the attack might be made, so the crews were kept on the alert. Nevertheless the Espadon torpedoed La Bretagne, and the Silure succeeded in discharging torpedoes at both liners simultaneously after the Espadon's attack on La Bretagne.

TO AID EUROPE AGAINST THE U. S.

Combined System of Protective Tariffs Planned.

THE IDEA IS DUE TO GERMANY IT WAS A WHITE WEDDING

It Will Be Submitted to the International Commercial Congress at Rome.

Rome, April 15.—The international agricultural congress inaugurated here yesterday by King Victor Emmanuel and Queen Helena. About 1,300 delegates were present. The American representatives, Dr. Daniel E. Salmon, chief of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry, and Henry E. Alvord, chief of the dairy division of the United States Department of Agriculture, have not yet arrived.

Courtesy of Schwerin Loewitz, a leading member of the Reichstag and president of the German Agricultural Council, arrived here today. It has been stated that he will present a proposition to the agricultural congress for a European agricultural-commercial Zollverein to meet American competition. The count said tonight:

"My proposition does not exactly contemplate a European Zollverein, but merely an understanding between the European countries to put themselves in a position to safeguard their agricultural interests through a combined system of protective tariffs. I shall submit my proposition at tomorrow's session of the congress, and it will explain my ideas."

"My scheme is based on differences in the natural conditions of production which will have to be met by protectionist duties. These differences are considerably less between the European states, especially the central states, than between the European states and the overseas countries. The unequal competition of the non-European product is growing daily owing to the diminution in the expenses of transportation from non-European countries, especially America and the British colonies."

"I understand that economic superiority of large industrial territories tends toward coalition, hence a coalition of the European countries is absolutely necessary. The efforts in this direction have failed hitherto, because no government wishes to abandon its independence in this field in favor of such a union and it is also difficult to agree on a common tariff. "Protection is needed in varying proportions in the different countries and a common tariff demands a common administration. All this is difficult to establish. Besides, an economic coalition requires a certain political coalition which is far from likely. Hence the idea of a European customs union must be renounced, and instead it must be recommended that in concluding commercial treaties among the European states a clause be introduced whereby goods exported from one country to another shall enjoy special low duties which shall not be applied to the same goods coming from European countries. This would prepare a way to the future formation of a European customs union."

Count Schwerin Loewitz also intends to submit a proposition with a view to preventing non-European goods landed in one country from being exported therefrom as originating from the country in which they were first landed.

END OF A STRIKE

Warkville Trouble Satisfactorily Concluded.

Windsor, Ont., April 15.—At 7:15 yesterday morning the Canadian Pacific Company's plant in Warkville, resumed operations with 250 men at work. Only the machinists have held out. They number ten, and if they do not come to time within a few days, President McMath speaks of employing new men.

"I do not know why they did not return," said a spokesman. "No committees waited upon me to explain, and I have received no complaint from them. If possible, I would like to take them all back."

It is said the men will not return to work until the company recognizes their union. President McMath says the company will not run a union shop.

GILBERT PARKER SPEAKS

Says the Colonies Should Help the Motherland.

London, April 15.—Sir Gilbert Parker, M. P. for Gravesend, who is now convalescent after recent accident, today gave an interview upon the subject of the duty of the colonies to contribute to the support of the motherland. In part: "The motherland for generations past has protected the commerce and coasts of the colonies. Now the colonies have emerged from their financial minority and are able to help the motherland and have attained majorities of abundant prosperity. There is, therefore, a moral obligation resting upon the colonies to share with the motherland the expense of the common navy. Probably the first step should be the taking over of the maintenance of the naval bases and fortifications by the colonies. I would oppose both in the House of Commons and out any pressure to contribute or any form of contribution not in keeping with the democratic sentiment of the age. I feel sure that when the matter is properly explained the colonies will feel it a moral obligation to realize the benefit of willingly contributing to the empire's navy."

Explosion Kills Five.

Gallipoli, Ohio, April 15.—The boiler of the Charles Bevans sawmill at Ruby (Ohio) exploded yesterday, killing Charles Bevans, Richard Huock, Rufus Houck and two boys, and wounding Houck and Gottfried. Several others were badly injured.

Went Through Bridge.

Glance Bay, C. B., April 15.—An 11-ton engine, in charge of Engineer James Parsons, and Fireman Dickson, coming up from Louisburg this morning with a train of seventy empty cars, went through the drawbridge at Mira Gut, which was open and a flag out. The fireman jumped, but Engineer Parsons went down with his engine. His body was recovered, Parsons was 55 years old and leaves a wife and family at Louisburg.

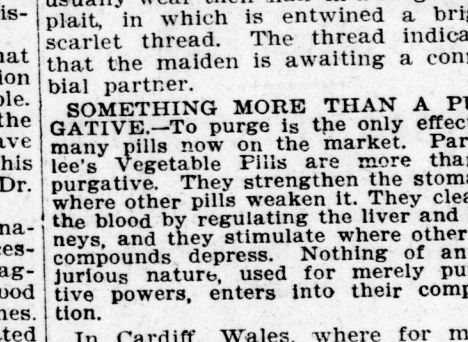

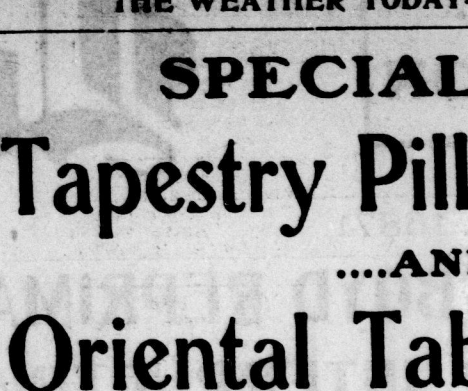
