# TO BE SOLD?

London's Street Railway in the Market.

As a Result of the Everett-Moore Financial Troubles.

Stock-It Is Said That E. W. Moore May Lose the Presidency.

Offer of \$180 Per Share for the

E. W. MOORE MAY LOSE PRESI-

Akron, O., Jan. 18 .- At the annual neeting of the Northern Ohio Traction Company here today, E. W. Moore, H. A. Everett, C. W. Wason, B. Mahler, J. R. Nutt, William Christy and Charles Currie were re-elected directors. The election of officers will take place next week. It is said that at the request of the Cleveland bankers' committee, William Christy, of this city, will succeed E. W. Moore as president of the company. The annual report of the road shows gross earnings, \$617,001; expenses and taxes, \$350,-845; net earnings, \$266,166; fixed charges, \$136,162; surplus, \$130,004; dividends or preferred stock, \$50,000; balance for common stock, \$80,000. Operating expenses were 56 per cent of receipts. LONDON STREET RAILWAY FOR

Cleveland, Jan. 18 .- Chairman Newcomb, of the bankers' committee, in charge of the Everett-Moore syndicate, said today that as soon as it could be accomplished, certain properties of the syndicate would be disposed of, and the proceeds turned into the Federal Telephone Company.

One valuable property that is to be sold will be the London, Ont., street railway, which has twenty-eight miles of track and exclusive rights to operate in London. Some time ago, it is said the syndicate was offered \$180 per share for the stock of the company, which has a capitalization of \$400,000 in stocks and \$400,000 in bonds, and ast year showed gross earnings \$141,000, with a surplus of \$33,454. The offer was refused. The members of the committee say that while they do not expect such a favorable offer at this time, they feel that the sale of this property will bring a good figure. It is understood that the bankers' committee will sell the London street railway system if a favorable offer is

No meeting of the bankers' committee was held today, and the next meeting will be held Monday. A MEETING TODAY.

Cleveland, Jan. 19.—The bankers' committee in charge of the Everettoore syndicate will hold tomorrow aftenoon. The developments of the past week have practically caused the members of the committee to decide upon a somewhat different line of action than at first intended. The primary object of the committee is to preserve intact the equities of those in the syndicate and to prevent any depreciation in the values of the securities. In order to accomplish this plan in regard to all the interests of the syndicate it is now extremely probable that a number of properties will be sold. That is all the syndicate's interests in the properties sold will be

The Northern Ohio Traction Company, one of the strongest Everett-Moore holdings, sold at 50, nine points below the previous low point. E. W. Moore will retire as president of the Northern Ohio Traction Company, at meeting of the directors next week. This system controls many urban and interurban lines in the northern part of the state.

#### CANAL PROJECT

To Connect Lake Huron and Lake Erie-London May Be In It.

Ottawa. Jan. 20 .- The Huron and Erie Canal Company gives notice that it will apply at the coming session for incorporation, with power to construct a canal not less than eighteen feet deep from a point in Huron or Lambton county, on the east shore of Lake Huron, to a point on the northern shore of Lake Erie in Elgin county. The company also asks for power operate all terminals, and to acquire all existing canals and rights in navigable and unnavigable streams en route from point to point; also for the right to operate electric and steam railways within a radius of fifteen miles of the canal route.

#### SECOND SHOCK EXPERIENCED

Repetition of Earthquake at Chilpancingo.

Many Buildings, Spared in First Shock, Razed-Full Number of Casualties Is Not Known.

Mexico City, Jan. 18.—Chilpancingo, the capital of the state of Guerrero, has been for two days in indescribable panic, for yesterday there came a repetition of the earthquake shock of Thursday, razing to the ground many houses spared in the first earthquake The people are camping out on the Alameda, and in the fields. Hundreds of families are ruined. The buildings destroyed include the 17th Battalion's barracks, from which the soldiers were ordered, thus saving their lives. chool buildings are wrecked, but luckily the children were all saved, their teachers having rare presence of mind and giving the order for them to march to the street when the first rumbling of the earth began on Thursday. The parish church, which was being repaired, having been injured in a recent earthquake, was destroyed. When the shock began it was nearly filled with worshipers, who fled in dismay, women being knocked down by men, but fortunately all had gained the street when the heavy stone arches fell in. It is believed that everyone escaped, though the soldiers are removing the debris which is piled up

in great heaps. Gov. Mora and his secretary escaped from the state palace in time to save themselves and proceeded to aid the wounded and panic-stricken people. The statue of Gen. Nicholas Bravo was thrown down and the town government building was so badly cracked that its fall is momentarily expected. Great fissures opened across the streets. The Church of San Mateo, in one of the outer districts, was nearly destroyed.

Among the dead already found are four young women and two young girls. The list of wounded is a long one, including many prominent citizens. No official list of dead and wounded has been given out as yet. In the town of Chilapa many buildings were badly cracked and persons were killed outright, while four were injured. In the towns of Tixtla and Marchitlan many buildings were cracked. At Ingula several arches fell in and there was general wreckage in shops. At Zumphagno del Rio, three persons were badly injured, and the prison, town hall, schools and courts are wrecked.
