The Boston Americans and the New York Nationals are to play for the world's championship. In event of approval being given it is Mr. Brush's intention to arrange for the championship series to be played next spring. The decision was made known through a letter sent today to President Pulliam, of the National League. In making the letter public President Pulliam said: "I believe that this is the right way to arrive at the desired series for the world's championship. The suggestions of Mr. Brush are proper and sportsmanlike. They have my hearty approval."

Neil was well supported by many influential Americans. The early rounds were rather in the American's favor, and in the 9th round he almost had Bowker beaten. From that time forward Bowker greatly improved, and administered a lot of punishment, which Neil sustained in plucky fashion. It was an interesting fight throughout.

POLITICAL NOTES.

Marthaville, Oct. 18.—The Conservative East Lambton met in convention here on Saturday evening. The principal speakers were Mr. Hanna, former member for the local House, and Jos. Armstrong, who seeks re-election to the House of Commons. There were barely a hundred in the audience, and the meeting was greatly lacking in interest. The speeches of Messrs. Use Provincial Lists.

Ottawa, Oct. 17.—The circular being sent out by the secretary of state, dealing with the lists in the unorganized districts of Ontario, in forms county judges, sheriffs, magistrates, justices of the peace, returning officers and others interested in the preparation, revision and utilization of voters' lists, that the order-in-council of Aug. 25 was predicated on the assumption that the provincial lists, in course of preparation, would not be completely revised in time for the approaching federal election, but that the approaching federal election, but that they are instructed the provincial lists are to be adopted in preference to the federal list. Returning officers are further instructed that if lists are not ready in time to be printed, they should be forwarded in manuscript to the secretary of state.

No ballot was required. E. B. Osler is the Conservative candidate.

St. Thomas, Oct. 17.—The Conservatives in convention at Dutton today, chose Mr. Wm. Jackson, of Southwold, as their candidate for West Elgin. Mr. Jackson, of Southwold, T. W. Kirkpatrick, of Rodney; A. M. McMahon, of Dutton; T. W. Crothers, St. Thomas; B. McKillop, West London; Aids, Meehan, Lawrence and Pons-McKillop, St. Thomas; Ex-Warden E. J. Trillip, Archibald, and McPherson, of St. Thomas, were nominated, but all withdrew excepting McMahon, who was elected. The ballot resulted in the selection of Mr. Jackson, and Mr. Kirkpatrick moved that unanimous, amid ringing cheers.
