LONDON WILL ASK POWER FIGURES

Special Committee Held a Brief Session on Saturday Night.

The hydro-electric power commission will be asked by the council to submit figures for the cost of a distributing plant in this city. Such was the recommendation of the special committee appointed, on motion of Ald. Stevely, to consider this question, at its meeting on Saturday evening.

Hon. Adam Beck was interviewed by members of the committee and he told them that the figures would be forthcoming when wanted. The other clauses of the motion regarding the purchase of the London Electric Company's plant, were left in abeyance until the figures of the hydro-electric commission are received, and then they will be dealt with.

Those present were Ald. Gillen, chairman, Ald. Stevely, Ald. Gerry and Ald. Booth.

A Huge Estimate.
According to a rumor the distributing plant will cost in the neighborhood of \$100,000 if the figures of the hydro-electric commission engineers are to be believed. The commission will build the transmission lines, and all other expenses incident to bringing Niagara power to London, and pay for them out of the sale of power. The estimated cost of the power will be not greater than \$23 a horsepower, but it is said that it will reach that figure. Loss of energy in stepping down and other losses will bring the cost to that figure.

STIRRING SERMONS MARK SABBATH

The City Preachers Discuss Live Questions of the Day—Anniversary Services.

"Perils in the Path of London's Citizens," was the theme of a stirring sermon at Dundas Center Church last night by Rev. E. B. Lancelley.

The speaker declared that at present Londoners were face to face with questions which must be solved now, and the solution, which meant much for the future of the city. If the resolutions adopted by the Rational Sunday League were allowed to come in force, there was an end of the Sabbath for the workman, he declared. Sunday would be followed by Sunday theaters, and in a short time the whole country would be demoralized. Mr. Lancelley also touched upon gambling, saying that there was more of it going on in many of the city clubs than many persons imagined.

Anniversary services were held in St. James' Church, South London, when the pulpit was occupied on both occasions by Rev. Canon Abbott, of Christ Church, Cathedral, Hamilton. Both services were largely attended and the sermons listened to with a great deal of attention. The special musical programme arranged by the choir for the anniversary was rendered in a most excellent manner, and was greatly enjoyed.

Life and conditions as existing among the Doukhobors of the Canadian West was the subject of a most interesting address at the First Congregational Church last night by Dr. J. T. Reid, who for many years worked among these people.

At St. Paul's Cathedral in the morning Canon Dann preached a powerful sermon on "Loyalty to the Faith." The speaker laid a great deal of emphasis upon the different religious movements which were taking place in modern times, and especially in the last few years. Taking Christian Science as an example, Canon Dann said it was a teaching which was opposed to faith and all the principles of faith. The New Theology was another modern belief which had been started and which was to be feared as it was not built upon a true foundation.

Rev. Dyson Hague preached by request last evening from Proverbs III, 11-14: "My son despise not the chastening of the Lord," prefacing his remarks by referring to the greatness of the times in which we are living, and the value of young life to this age. He reminded his hearers of the fact that this was a text often forgotten, and went on to remark that if he had any influence in the management of the public school system he would work not only for weekly scrubbed classrooms, plenty of air and light all the year round, but also the memorizing by every boy and girl in the day schools of Canada certain passages of Holy Scripture. He then went on to say that the text emphasized two facts that theorists and faddists forget, that the Old Testament teaches the love of God and the fatherhood of God. The value of discipline was strongly impressed by Mr. Hague.

At Wellington Street Methodist Church last night a large audience was present to hear Rev. S. T. Bartlett, assistant general secretary of the Epworth League of Canada. Mr. Bartlett is an old London boy, and his remarks were listened to with a great deal of interest. In the morning Mr. Bartlett spoke at Askin Street Methodist Church.
