ONLY THREE TEACHERS
LIVE OUTSIDE CITY

And All Are Ladies—The City
Loses Eight Dollars a Year.

The city council were after big game when they made a report to the board of education asking that body to take steps to see that the school teachers living outside the city limits should be compelled to pay income tax into the city treasury.

It was thought when the question was first mooted that a considerable number of the teachers lived outside the limits, and that the sum the city would derive from this source would be large.

Upon investigation it was found that only three teachers, young ladies, lived outside.

There was one of the teachers in the Collegiate living in the township, but he moved in some time ago. The total sum that the city would receive from income tax from these three ladies would be about \$8, not a very large sum of money over which to stir up a row.

JUDGE SCOTTE DEAD

Montreal, Sept. 6.—Judge Louis W. Scotte, judge of session for the Province of Quebec, and clerk of the crown for peace, Montreal district, died very suddenly last night at Vaudeville, Quebec.

Judge Scotte had been in ordinary health, and while engaged in conversation with Lieut.-Col. LaBelle collapsed and died in a few moments.

He was born at Boucherville, Que., in 1838. After some years spent in the practice of law he became clerk of the crown in 1882, and in 1897 was named judge of sessions. He leaves a widow and five children. Heart failure is thought to have been the cause of death.

AMERICAN PRICES ARE SOARING

That "Invasion" of Canadian Markets a Phantom.

EVERYTHING AWAY UP

Draft Horses Will Bring \$400 to \$500 Per Head in Buffalo.

The Toronto Star says: The "American invasion" is a phantom. The following letter received by Messrs. Hagersville, Ont., from a firm of Buffalo dealers is self-explanatory, and shows what are the actual conditions. The letter has created something of a sensation in Haldimand County, where it has been read on the platform. It is from the Crandall Horse Company, of which H. P. Madden is president and A. D. Cronk, treasurer and general manager.

East Buffalo, N. Y., Aug. 25.
Messrs. Hagersville, Ont.:
Dear Sirs:—In reply to your inquiry in regard to the prices of horses on the Buffalo market:

I don't think it would be possible for you to buy horses here that could be sold in Canada to get the money back, to say nothing about the duty. A good draft horse, weighing from 1,600 to 1,800 pounds would bring on this market, if we could get them from \$400 to \$500 per head, and we could sell any number to the New York trade, if they could be bought.

They are very scarce, and it is almost impossible to get hold of a top draft horse at any price.

The Ohio feeders are not feeding them this fall, something that has not occurred before in a long time; on account of the high price of feeders, and of hay and corn, etc.

Ohio Hay Poor.
Hay is worth \$20 a ton, in the barn in Ohio, and not a good quality at that.

It looks as if corn would bring 65c and oats 50c before they stop.

There is a great shortage of cattle, hogs and all classes of feeders, and the farmers of this country are getting all the money.

I fully believe if the reciprocity bill passes, and I have no doubt that it will in Canada, that you had better get yourselves in condition to ship everything in the line of stock to this country for a time at least.

If I were in your place I would contract grain, horses, cattle, hogs, and everything I could buy in the live

stock line to take immediately after the bill passes.

Remember Apples.
I would not overlook apples, as they are going to be high and scarce. Also potatoes are bringing \$1.50 on this market at present.

Now get busy, and if you can contract a lot of stock to be taken after the bill passes, and want a partner, I would be glad to take an interest with you. I believe it is the time of your life to make a lot of money quick and easy.

If you can get hold of a good farm, that you think will suit me at a fair price, secure it, as I am sure if I did not want to take it myself, I would be able to sell at a good profit.

There will be a great immigration into Canada no doubt.

Now keep this to yourselves, and take advantage of conditions, and let me know what you are doing.

INCARNATE BIBLE INTO ONE'S LIFE

Stirring Address by Dr. Campbell Morgan, Great English Preacher.

ON VISIT TO TORONTO

Speaks in Interests of South American Mission Work.

Toronto, Sept. 7.—Stirring and insistent was the message rung out to the ears of the vast audience thronging Knox Church to the farthest corner of the gallery last night, as to the place and value of the Bible in the life of the nation. The speaker, Rev. Dr. George Campbell Morgan, the great English Nonconformist divine, held the rare attention of his hearers for almost an hour with burning eloquence, as he rapidly argued his leading propositions, concluding with an earnest plea for a return on the part of the church to the study of the Word of God, not merely to know it intellectually, but to obey it and to inculcate it in the everyday life of the individual and of the nation.

The occasion of Dr. Morgan's presence in the city was the desire on the part of the board of directors of the newly-formed Evangelical Union of South America, of which he is one, for a personal consultation in Toronto with the North American Council of the Regions Beyond Missionary Union, whose work in Peru and Argentina

has been of late years of increasing importance.

Dr. Morgan's address was a stirring and insistent plea for a return on the part of the church to the study of the Word of God, not merely to know it intellectually, but to obey it and to inculcate it in the everyday life of the individual and of the nation.

Value of the Bible.

"In the midst of the strenuous and remarkable days in which we are living," said Dr. Morgan, "it behooves us to regard the value of the Bible to the great Empire to which we belong, and to the Canadian nation which is in the making. When a country is in the making it is the most fascinating thing in God's world. See to it that in the making this Book is not excluded."

Four values, he urged, in the life of the nation were created by the Bible: It furnishes the moral standards which make for great civilization; it gives the conception of God which has inspired the great philanthropies; it affords the view of the nature of man which has stirred the heart of man to serve and help him, being a missionary life within him; and it supplies the only evangel of the forgiveness of sins which is demonstrated true by the results it produces.

"These," he said, "are values in the national life which we cannot afford to do without, but which we shall most assuredly lose if we lose the Bible, and which we shall give to every nation to which we give the Bible."

Quotes John Wesley.
Speaking of the emblems on the two great London publishing houses of the Times and the British and Foreign Bible Society, Father Time, with

his sickle, and the open Bible, bearing the legend, "The Word of the Lord endureth for ever," Dr. Morgan declared with emphasis that "no man can be a true Christian who fails to read both these things: the daily newspaper, which chronicles the duties of time, and the Bible, which contains the principles of eternity."

He quoted the words of John Wesley: "I read my newspaper to see how God is governing the world." "But no man can see that if he reads only his newspaper," added the preacher. And he insisted on the truth of the old motto of Glasgow: "Let Glasgow flourish by the preaching of the Word."

Dealing briefly with the evangel of the Word, Dr. Morgan said no man was ever born of God without the Word of God in his mind. We shall be guilty unless we see that they have the Bible. How is a nation to get the Bible? Print it, publish it; but not that alone; you must get it into your own life to give it to others. When it thus becomes a thing in the life of the individual, it becomes a dynamo of the nation. It becomes a dynamo of the nation. There is nothing more important than that we should know, obey and study this Book."
