Firebug Again Busy This Time in East

Blaze Located Sunday Night in Tool House of an East End Factory—Firemen Respond to a Funny False Alarm.

This belief is strengthened by the fact that there was no fire in the building during the day. The alarm was sent into the central hall at 7:20, and the firemen succeeded in extinguishing the blaze before much damage was done.

Funny False Alarm.

One of the employees of the Hayman & Mills stables, located at the corner of Maitland street and the Grand Trunk tracks, was fumigating the stable early Sunday morning. A passerby saw smoke issuing from the building and turned in an alarm. The department responded in a hurry and on their arrival smoke was still issuing from the building. Hurriedly connecting lines to a nearby hydrant the firemen rushed in and found the employee getting ready to add a little more sulphur to a pan in which some was already burning.

SARNIA'S NEW MARKET TO OPEN ON SATURDAY NEXT

Monster Gathering Planned To Celebrate the Opening of the New Market Buildings—Citizens Greatly Pleased at Prospects of Getting Country Produce Direct.

Sarnia, Sept. 22.—Saturday next will be the official opening of Sarnia's new market building and the day is going to be a big one. Prominent citizens will be on hand to make speeches, coffee and lunch will be served to the visitors in the restaurant by the Local Council of Women, entertainments will be furnished and produce of all kinds will be on exhibition.

The new market means more for Sarnia than is generally realized, and farmers from a radius of 15 miles around will bring their stuff here to be disposed of. The hundreds of newcomers to Sarnia from other towns, brought here by the new factories, etc., are all accustomed to buying their foodstuffs at the public market and they will be among the foremost patrons of the new market buildings.

Producers of high-grade butter, cheese and other articles will be more than satisfied, as their articles will not be sold, as before, under the ruling prices but will be disposed of on their merits. For instance, one man makes poor butter and another man good butter. As things are at present both get the same price for their butter under the prevailing fixed price.

But on the market people will be willing to buy from the man who makes good butter, and pay no more than the same price for an inferior grade as they have to do at present. The new market will not be detrimental at all to the grocers, as people will buy on the market undoubtedly, but all the farmers coming in will make their purchases at the grocery stores. Everyone is agreed that the new market building is money well expended, and that it will more than pay for itself in a couple of years.

THAW WILL COME UP FOR HEARING TUESDAY

The Extradition Fight Will Start Before Governor Felker in New Hampshire.

Concord, N. H., Sept. 22.—The scene of the litigation over Harry K. Thaw shifts this week to the New Hampshire capital, just across the street from the hotel where the Matteawan fugitive has been sheltered since last Wednesday.

Governor Felker arrived today to make final arrangements for the extradition hearing before him tomorrow. Pending the arrival of William T. Jerome, special deputy attorney-general of New York, the hearing will be made known concerning the arguments in support of the extradition petition. None of the New York authorities were here this forenoon.

The place for holding the hearing was one of the matters to be decided by Governor Felker today. Two rooms have been suggested, one the Senate Chamber and the other the Hall of Representatives. The Senate Chamber seats 50 comfortably, but this number could be doubled to meet an emergency. This is the room favored by those in authority here, who believe that the audience should be limited to counsel and newspapermen. Should the hearing be public, it probably would be held in the Hall of Representatives, where there is room for 1,000 persons. Thaw and his counsel say they have no preference in the matter, and will be entirely satisfied with whatever arrangements Governor Felker deems best. They continued to express confidence in the strength of the case they have prepared.

GEORGE A. MORSE DEAD.

Leamington, Sept. 22.—George A. Morse, aged 80, for over half a century a resident of Leamington, died at his home, after a brief illness. He was born in Jefferson County, New York State, and came here with his father, a lumberman, at the age of eighteen. Mr. Morse was a staunch Liberal, and one of the best-known men in Essex County. He served the township of Mersea as reeve for ten years and was warden of the county in 1886. He was thirty years clerk of the division court, and thirty-three years recording secretary of the Methodist Church. He leaves a family of one son and three daughters.

POLE FOREST GROWING ON STREETS OF CITY

At Some Corners There Are No Less Than Six of Unsightly Things.

London is the forest city. It rejoices in that moniker in song and story. Incidentally it is the forest city in reality. Back in the dim ages of the past "London in the Bush" was the classic appellation that was tacked on to the name of our fair city. As progress and development eliminated the "bush," the more dignified title of Forest City took the place of mere London in the bush. Time progressed a little further in its endless circle of days, and the virgin forest disappeared, but the city still maintained its proud title. Then the reforestation process started. The telephone, the telegraph, the electric light company, the city electric service, and the street railway have all helped to again make London the Forest City.

Pole Forest is Growing. It is no new thing for London to have the Forest City moniker or to be called the forest city. At some corners there are no less than six poles, together with a few additional guy stumps that help to make the said corners attractive. According to those who are in touch with the situation it is time the Dominion and Provincial acts, stepped in and made arrangements to discontinue the use of so many poles.

It is claimed that the water commission should have at least tried to remedy this evil. No action has yet been taken by the commission to remedy the overhead wire evil down town, while the pole evil of the outlying districts is even in worse condition.

A Recent Instance. One of the most recent instances of the pole evil is found at the corner of Elmwood avenue and Ridout streets. There the corner was cut, by the engineering department, to allow a wider space between the street railway curve recently put in on the south side. The change in the street and sidewalk line left one of the hydro electric poles four feet outside the curb, and necessitated changing the entire line of hydro power wires, to a pole set ten feet from the corner of Elmwood avenue, and then back to the first pole south of the corner on Ridout street.

"A high pole should have been set at the corner, where the Lone electric pole stands," said Line Superintendent Charles Alford, of the city electrical department, this morning. "If one had been placed there it would have carried all the wires and saved all these other poles that disfigure the corner. As it was the street railway company are using our pole now to prevent another being put in."

Queen's Daughter Is Deaf and Dumb

Manchester, Eng., Sept. 22.—Relatives of the Queen of Spain have been shocked by the news that the second daughter of the queen will be like her second son, both deaf and dumb, says the Manchester Guardian. It is feared that the little Spanish princess is totally deaf, and unless this can be corrected she will probably never be able to speak.

She goes constantly with her children to the convents of the religious orders in and near Madrid, to ask for prayers of intercession on their behalf, and particularly on behalf of her young daughter.

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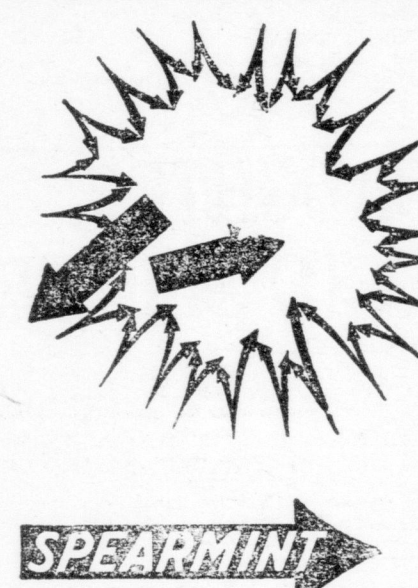
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
