

EILEEN BARRON LOCATED
AT GRANDFATHER'S HOME
IN NEWCASTLE, ONTARIO

Little London Girl, Who Was Spirited Away From City on Tuesday, Seen on Streets of Village—Mother of Child Also There, and Detectives Are Investigating the Case.

Eileen Barron, the little nine-year-old girl, alleged to have been kidnapped from Talbot street school on Tuesday afternoon, is now at Newcastle, Ont., at the home of her grandfather, R. J. Elbeick. The child was seen on the village streets last evening. Her mother, a former resident of the village, was also seen. Their appearance caused a mild sensation for the story of the girl's kidnapping from the London school had appeared in the Toronto evening papers and the residents of Newcastle were cognizant of the trouble here.

Remaining Indoors.
The mother and daughter were still at the father's home this morning, but remained indoors. Traces were seen of them, but it is claimed that Mrs. Barron had talked to none of her former acquaintances there.

Refused to Talk.
"I have nothing to say for the public at all," was the only answer he gave to inquiries as to whether the case would be contested and what the mother's future action would be. He

admitted that his daughter and the missing child were in his home, but further than that he refused to comment.

The Newcastle police informed The Advertiser over long-distance "phone" that the child and her mother had been seen. No action had been taken, however, because of the absence of either warrants or instructions from London.

Detectives Investigating.
Detectives, acting for the Toronto attorneys of Alfred Barron, father of Eileen, were sent to Newcastle, according to Miss Barron, aunt of the child, and with whom she lived here till she was spirited away Tuesday. No report had been received by Miss Barron, however, as to what had been discovered at Newcastle, until she was informed of The Advertiser's successful search this afternoon.

"I am glad of it," said Miss Barron, when an Advertiser reporter informed her that the little girl had been located. "We were afraid that Mrs. Barron would take her to Reno, where she got her divorce, but where custody of the child was denied her."

"My brother, who is still in Atlantic City, ordered his Toronto attorneys to send a letter to Mrs. Barron, but I had heard nothing of what they had found there. I expected, however, to hear some time today."

RAILWAYS WILL
CEASE EFFORTS
TO GET SETTLERS

Government Will Look After the Immigration Propaganda Alone in Future.

Big Lines Plan to Attract the Wealthy Tourists From All Over the World.

Ottawa, June 13.—For its supply of ordinary immigrants Canada will hereafter depend entirely on the efforts of the Federal immigration propaganda. The Canadian railways, which have made extensive efforts in the past to attract the immigrant who travels third-class and enters the factory or goes upon the farm, have decided to leave this work entirely to the Government.

The railways are going after the bigger game. It has been arranged between the Government and the railroad authorities that the Dominion will augment its propaganda to be old country workman, while the railways will confine their efforts to inducing tourists to visit Canada.

Better Facilities.
With such great national attractions for the sightseers as the St. Lawrence, with its great water falls, the great lakes and the mountain scenery of British Columbia, and with the splendid chain of hotels which have been created by the Canadian Pacific, and which are being added to by the Canadian Northern and by the Grand Trunk, it is believed that a great volume of high-class tourist travel can be attracted to Canada from Britain, the continent of Europe and the United States.

C. P. R. Agent and Family Crashed Into Engine While Riding on Motor.

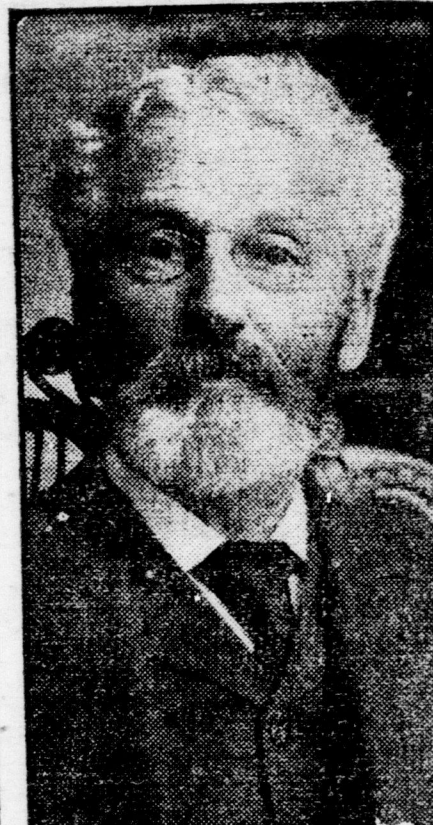

MONEY IS TIGHT
BECAUSE OF WAR
SAYS MINISTER

Blames Recent Struggles for the Present High Cost of Living.

Optimistic Outlook in Financial Conditions, Says President of Buffalo Bank.

Ottawa, June 13.—An appeal by several of the speakers for a change in the United States banking system, which would bring it more or less in line with that of Canada, a pronouncement on the present state of the money market which was on the whole optimistic in its outlook by the president of the Bank of Buffalo, Mr. E. G. McDougall, and statement by Hon. W. T. White, minister of finance, that war and excessive armament were responsible for the high cost of money and the high cost of living, were all features of today's general session of the New York State Bankers' Association in the Chateau Laurier.

War is the Cause.
Hon. W. T. White, Canadian minister of finance, said that the great cause of money stringency, of high rates of interest and the high cost of living is war. He traced the history of recent wars, including the Spanish-American struggle, the South African and Balkan wars.

All the money then spent was as lost from an economic point of view, as if it had been poured into the sea, and it all helped to prove that war and armament expenses were the big factors in high living costs. He referred to the homogeneity of the people of the United States and Canada. When the two were so much alike, how could there be anything but 100 years of peace.

World's Banker.
Hon. Samuel P. Padgett, chairman of the committee of naval affairs of the United States Congress, gave statistics of the workings of the banks of England, England, with a per capita circulation of but \$21 could do the banking business of the world; therefore the United States, with a per capita circulation of \$100, should not be handicapped. The trouble was that the United States system of currency was not elastic enough, did not respond readily to the demands of the country. The speaker did not believe in a bond-secured currency, which tended to increase or contract the currency at just about the wrong times. The United States also lacked a co-ordinating credit system.

Has No Head.
"We have no head to the banking and currency system of the United States," said Hon. Mr. Padgett. He referred to the discount rate of the Bank of England, as the great thermometer of the money market. With 25,000 banks of various characters, the United States lacked any agency to let the world know the omittion of the industrial world. In times of Continued on Page Eleven.

Manufacturers Committee Asks That Mr. Gordon Phillips Be Industrial Commissioner Despite Strong Argument Put Up for Employment of a Local Man.

Gordon Phillips, now assistant to the Winnipeg commissioner, was today at the Manufacturers' committee to the city council for the position of publicity commissioner for London. On a third ballot and after a good many motions and counter-motions, Mr. Phillips' name was sent on to the council.

Some For Local Man.
Division at today's session of the manufacturers' committee was largely caused by Ald. Stein's support of Mr. A. E. Welch for the position. Ald. Bennett moved that the name of ex-Ald. W. J. Underwood also be sent on to the council, and supported by both local and non-local members. With the exception of Ald. Stein, Bennett and Robinson, who all voted for Mr. Welch, the other members of the city council voted for Mr. Phillips. Confidential communications regarding Mr. Phillips' qualifications, received from Winnipeg, were read, and were all greatly to his credit, but Ald. Stein and Ald. Robinson expressed a preference for the appointment of a local man.

Mr. Welch addressed the committee briefly for the position was read. **Board of Trade Proposes.**
The board of trade proposed to combine the office of publicity commissioner and the civic publicity commissioner was favorably discussed, and a recommendation to the city council that the plan be adopted was adopted by a majority of 10 to 3.

It was proposed to send both the names of Mr. Underwood and Mr. Welch to the council. Ald. Stein thought Mr. Phillips' name should go, but the supporters of Mr. Phillips proposed voting on the three names. On the first ballot Mr. Underwood was dropped out of the running. On the second ballot Mr. Phillips won by a vote of four for Mr. Welch, Chairman Spittal voting with the majority.

SCANDAL CHARGES FALL FLAT
BRITISH MEMBERS ABSOLVED

Absolutely No Foundation for the Charges Made Against Sir Rufus Isaacs, Lloyd George or Postmaster Samuel.

UNIONISTS RESENT SIR EDWARD CARSON
APPEARING AS COUNSEL FOR LIBERALS

London, June 13.—British cabinet ministers were today absolved by the parliamentary committee from all blame in connection with the scandals alleged to have surrounded the contracts between the British Government and Marconi Wireless Company.

The report of the parliamentary committee which investigated the affair was issued today, and declared that there is no foundation for any of the charges made against Attorney-General Sir Rufus Isaacs, Chancellor of the Exchequer David Lloyd George, or Postmaster-General Herbert L. Samuel. The committee finds that all the ministers concerned acted throughout in the sincere belief that there was nothing in their action which would conflict with their duty as ministers of the crown.

No Influence Used.
The report further says that no evidence was given showing that any member of the British Government exercised any influence in order to procure the contract for the English Marconi Company or in any way acted contrary to the public interest in behalf of that company, or used knowledge acquired in their official capacity for their private profit, or were in any way concerned in any dealings in the shares of the company.

The report in conclusion strongly condemns the publication of charges which were absolutely untrue, and which these responsible for their circulation had no reason to believe to be true.
