INTERESTING SIDELIGHTS ON GREAT INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S CONGRESS

English Woman Writer Gives Bright Description of World's Gathering in Rome

Some interesting sidelights are thrown on the International Congress of Women now concluded at Rome, by Katharine Tynan, a contributor to the Westminster Gazette.

Miss Tynan describes some of the social gatherings which marked the opening of the congress. Of a typical assemblage, she says: "The beautiful rooms were thronged, and it was interesting to compare this assemblage of women with any other which one can call to mind. The speech was a veritable Tower of Babel, as can well be imagined when I mention the countries represented by delegates from their various councils. Of non-English-speaking countries there are represented Germany—in great force, for the country of home-keeping women seems now to produce intellectual women in great numbers—Sweden, Denmark, the Netherlands, Italy, France, Austria, Hungary, Norway, Belgium, Greece, Bulgaria, Serbia, Finland, Russia, Canada and America have sent large contingents, and the colonies are well represented."

"At the Hotel du Quirinale, the headquarters of the council, the place buzzes with many tongues and much business. Everyone is thoroughly enjoying themselves, and there is a delightful atmosphere of friendly helpfulness—sisterliness everywhere."

"The women of the council have a very different look from the globe-trotting ones. Bagdader in hand, or as I have said, from women in the aggregate generally. They look thoughtful; there is intellect and responsibility in their faces, and with them there is a joyousness that tells of something which has long been eagerly anticipated, perhaps worked for."

"At the reception last night I was struck by the stature of many of the ladies present. Many besides the presi-

dent had a most noble height, and the International Women's Council certainly does not disdain cliffs, for the dressing was remarkably good, as becoming an assemblage which had a very considerable share of beauty. Of eccentricity there was none, or perhaps there was one incident slightly flamboyant. I have seen fifty at a London literary gathering. The one exception was the lady who wore a scarf about her head on which 'Votes for Women' was printed in large letters."

"Tomorrow night, there will be the welcoming meeting, when the representatives of each country will say each a few words, and the National Anthem of each country will be sung, as well as a Song of the International Council, composed by the president of the Swedish Council."

"The visitors are of all ages. Golden youth is not lacking, for many young daughters and sisters and friends accompany the older ladies and enjoy the sights and the entertainments while their elders are in serious counsel. This sprinkling of youth is pretty and pleasant. Fraulein Alice Salomon, the corresponding secretary, to whom everyone goes all day long for everything, carries with her as she goes a blooming bevy of girls—who are not delegates. But, then, Fraulein Salomon, although she is far from having left youth behind, has a passion for the young girl, which is obviously reciprocated."

"For ten days to come this woman's parliament will be sitting on all the questions most vital to women. On Thursday it will be discussing the suffrage, which ought to be interesting. I imagine that the mass of the delegates are suffragists, but not Suffragettes."

"I overheard a very stately looking lady remark that her husband was much opposed to her meeting English women at the council lest she should come back bitten with the craze for militancy."

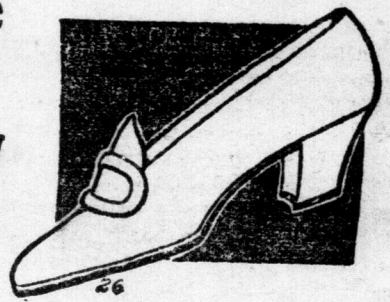

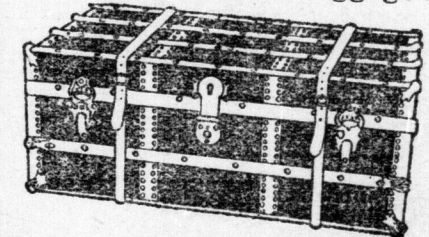

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Tapioea Cream.

One pint milk, one-half cup tapioea, one teaspoon vanilla, two eggs, one-half cup sugar, salt. Soak the tapioea overnight in cold water. Cook the milk and tapioea in a double boiler. For Bust Development.
Friend—Would you kindly tell me through your column, of something to develop the bust? I am rather tall and very slight; and also something that will remove a mole from the face.

A—1. I am sure you will find this deep-breathing exercise helpful—Stand erect in the doorway, with toes on the centre of the sill and the palms of the hands placed against the side of the door frame in a level with the shoulders. Then take

a deep breath and step forward as far as possible, first with one foot and then with the other, always keeping one foot on the sill. While forward, exhale deeply. This should be repeated several times, taking care not to tire the unaccustomed muscles too much at first. If regularly taken for a couple of months I am sure you will see an improvement. It might also be well to massage the bust lightly with coconut butter. Give light strokes or the massage may be of little use.

2. A mole is a dangerous thing to tamper with, and difficult to remove. Some have removed them successfully by keeping them saturated with olive or sweet oil. There are depilatories for removing moles, but these are sure to leave a disagreeable scar on the face.
