SERGEANTS HOLD
BRAVERY MEDALS

Honored In Active Service By
Humane Society For Splen-
did Heroism.

CREW TRAPPED IN HOLD

Rescuer Crawls Into Flooded
Hold and Opens Jammed
Door.

Among the sergeants of the 13th Bat-
talion are at least two who, in addition
to having seen active service in Africa,
are the proud possessors of Royal
Humane Society medals for bravery.
One is Sgt. R. H. Young, of Windsor,
and the other, Sgt. J. C. Prith, former-
ly of the 7th Regiment in the city.

Young was through the Somaliland
campaign of 1902-1904, and was one of
the crew of the third-class cruiser Por-
poise. It was in 1906, while serving as a
first-class stoker aboard H. M. S.
Montagu that he performed the gallant
action, which earned him recognition
from the Royal Humane Society.

Caught In Trap.

The Montagu had run on a rock near
Lundy Island, and through the jamming
of the machinery controlling one of
the water-light doors separating one of
the stoke-hold compartments from the
others, the men in that compartment
were caught like rats in a trap, unable
to escape from the rush of water.

Prith, sergeant, and the officer com-
manding the company to which they
were attached, Capt. Webb-Bowen, at
once dashed into the torrent and, after
a strenuous and dangerous half-hour
struggle, succeeded in rescuing the whole party.
Prith alone was responsible for the
lives of five British soldiers and two
native drivers. Artillery respirators
were resorted to, to bring round the
half-drowned men, but not one of them
succumbed.

Awarded Medal.

His plucky action was reported to the
Humane Society in England, and he was
awarded the medal, which was publicly
presented to him by Admiral Sir A. K.
Wilson.

The action, which earned Prith the
coveted medal and ribbon of the society,
occurred in South Africa, where he was
serving as a private during the Boer
war. A transport section was crossing
the Vaal river when the pontoon bridge
collapsed, hurling the whole section of
twenty mules and drivers into the swift-
ly flowing current.

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LONDON SOLDIER IS DEAD

David Cranston, Formerly Enlisted
Here, Succumbs in Cough.

David Cranston, some years ago a
member of the Royal Canadian Rifles
and enlisted at the barracks here, was
buried at Colborne on Saturday.
The funeral was held under the auspices of
St. John's Lodge, A. F. and A. M., the
members attending the funeral in a body.

The late Mr. Cranston went to Co-
bourne in 1908 as instructor of the Co-
bourne Battery. Previously, he
had resided in Toronto and had been a
member of the North West Mounted
Police, after leaving this city. He was
born in Lancaster, England, and came
to Canada when 15 years of age. He
married a Miss McDonald of this city.
His wife and three children survive. He
was 54 years of age.

BRITISH VETERAN
OF MANY BATTLES
TO FIGHT AGAIN

Sergt. Nanfan Enlists in 33rd
Battalion, and Will Go To
the Front.

ONCE MIDGET OF ARMY

Fought in Egyptian Campaign
—Was in at Finish at
Khartoum.

At one time the youngest and
smallest soldier in the British army, in
which he enlisted when he was only
11 inches high, and a midget of 4 feet
11 inches high, he is now a veteran of
many campaigns. Sergt. A. W. Nanfan
has enlisted again with the 33rd Bat-
talion, and expects and hopes to see
fighting once more.

Sergt. Nanfan was sergeant-in-
structor of bugles and drums in the
33rd, a rank which he has held for
many years. He enlisted in the Gren-
adier Guards in 1874, in which his
father was sergeant-major. He was
so small that he could not wear the
full uniform of the bandmen of the
Guards. In all the fighting which he
has taken part, he has never once
sounded.

In Egyptian Campaign.

Nanfan first saw fighting in the
Egyptian campaign of 1882, when he
was sent under the command of the
Duke of Connaught, at present the
Governor-General of Canada, to help
quell the uprising of the Arabs against
the Khedive. He arrived in Alexandria
while it was still smoking and smoul-
dering in ruins after the bombardment
from the bombardment of the British
and French fleets. From Port Said, with
Sir Garnet Wolseley, afterwards Lord
Gordon, he made the long
desert march to Ishmail and to Tel-El
Mahuta, the scene of the first pitched
battle. Soon after the force defeated
the natives at Tel-El-Kebir, and Sergt.
Nanfan was ordered home.

Wolseley had told the men at the
first of the campaign that he would
finish the war on Sept. 12. True to
his word, the men of the Guards were
banqueted in Cairo on the lucky 12th,
and again when they reached England.
The Duke of Connaught headed a pro-
cession of the various regiments of the
troops in the streets of London.

In the desert marches the men drop-
ped from thirst and fever, and the
Duke of Connaught, who was with the
force, related that his regiment walked
into the desert and trod a path of
corpses, of the natives which had been
killed by the British before by the
cavalry at Khirassan.

Praise for Duke.

About the Duke of Connaught, Sergt.
Nanfan says: "He was a brave
soldier, and a good man. He was
get into the front. Wolseley always had
him kept in the rear on some pretext
or other, because he feared for the
safety of the Duke. He was a
genuine soldier, and I have seen him
drink from the canal, half-filled with
dead camels, and men, too, just like
the rest of us. He was a good man,
and he was a good soldier. He was
dead from thirst. His highness knows
Nanfan, and they have corresponded
frequently while in this country."

In 1884 Nanfan volunteered for the
Soudan expedition, sent to the relief
of Gen. Gordon at Khartoum. He was
appointed bugler to Col. John Herbert,
who was general in command of the
force. He was with the force when it
