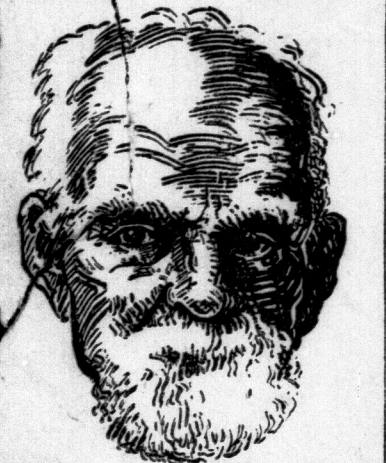

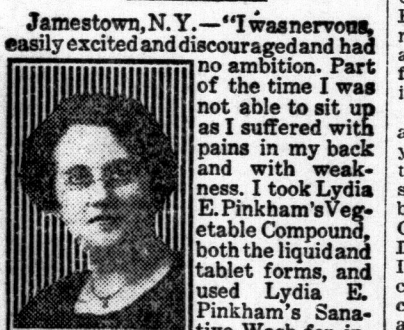

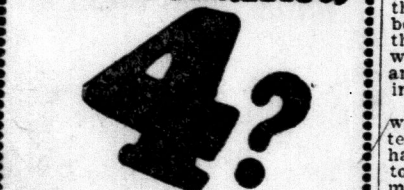

## FAIR BOARD ASKS CITY FOR \$9,347

Finance Will Introduce Increases in Rentals For Stalls On Market.

According to the decisions of the finance committee arrived at last night, the following changes will be introduced in the rentals of the various stalls and sites on the market. The rental of the stalls in the Market Garden Pavilion will be raised from \$15 a year to \$50; the stalls in Covent Garden Market will be increased by \$2.50 per month, and the stalls in the basement be advanced from \$7 to \$10. This was the result of a motion fathered by the mayor.

All these advances in the price of the stalls were strenuously opposed by Aldermen Drake and Greer on the ground that the market was primarily for the benefit of the farmer, and that there was no business sense of right sentiment in making these increases.

"What's the idea?" said Alderman Drake, "do you want to keep the farmer off the market altogether?" When Alderman Burdick stated that the city was entitled to some rentals on account of the money it spent on the market, Market Clerk Maker told the committee that in the last 21 years the city had put a new roof on one side of the market house, and had once whitewashed the walls.

Mayor Wenige and Alderman Judd wanted to charge the farmers wives 25 cents a piece for the use of the tables in the basement, and the council will be asked to discuss this question on Monday night. The two market spaces will be dispensed with altogether on the unanimous decision of the committee. A proposal to change the position of the shed running east and west on the north side of the market was referred to the council.

The Western Fair Board stated in a letter that they will have to ask the city this year for \$9,347.04, which is their deficit on the gate receipts for this year. Their total gate receipts were \$26,495.14, and the average for the past three years was \$35,842.18. This is another matter that the council will discuss on Monday night. Meanwhile, the Fair Board will be asked to furnish a complete statement of their receipts and expenditures.

Several deputations were heard by the committee. One representing the Welfare Association (George Reid), the Chamber of Commerce (James Gray), and the Red Cross (Mrs. Ronald Harris), asked the committee to endeavor to find some means of raising a relief fund for the Japanese in their present trouble, and introduced by Mrs. Gray. The committee, who were favorable to the suggestion and thought it a desirable one, promised to give it their earnest consideration.

**Ask Amendment.** A deputation from the London Grocers' Association, led by Harry Ranshaws, asked that the committee amend the city bylaw dealing with the hucksters on the market. They suggested that: (1) No vehicles be allowed on the market for the purpose of holding space. (2) That anyone selling anything that is not grown by him is a huckster. (3) That no foreign fruit or vegetables be sold on the London market. The committee, which was very much in agreement with the grocers, will instruct the city solicitor to prepare an amendment to the present bylaw to include these suggestions.

Edwin Smith, secretary of the Old Boys' Association, appeared before the finance committee asking for a grant of some \$1,000, being the deficit of the association as the result of Old Boys' Week. He stated he received no salary or honorarium for his work, and had only charged the association for the actual expenses which he had incurred out of his own pocket. A police court stenographer was appointed at a salary of \$1,040 per year. A. A. Langford was awarded the contract of binding the city assessment books at a price of \$9.50 per book, this being the lowest tender. On the motion of Alderman Greer, Dr. Brittain of the Citizens' Research Institute, will be asked by the city clerk to send in his report on the city hall and the salary question with all possible despatch.

## CENTRAL'S GRIDDERS HAVE BIG JOB AHEAD

Must Fill Four Vacancies Because of Restriction To Bona-fide Students.

Some fifteen of Central Collegiate's huskies went through two hours' stiff gridding at Tecumseh Park yesterday afternoon, the only disappointing factor of the meritorious drill being the fact that there were only fifteen or so present. But those who were out were sent through signal practice and tackling, and they made the most of it. Since it seems almost certain that Central will be minus at least four of the available college stars in the city, through the decision of the Central Collegiate authorities to restrict the membership on Central's eleven to bona-fide students of Central, something crucial may face the coaches within a short time, unless athletes who are eligible for Central's squad turn out in thicker numbers.

## JAPANESE REFUGEES CONSTANTLY LANDING

Federal and British Columbia Authorities Unite in Facing Problem.

Special to The Advertiser. Ottawa, Sept. 26.—The problem of caring for the refugees from Japan who are constantly landing on the Pacific shores of the Dominion is being met by the Federal and British Columbia authorities in a manner

which it is expected will be mutually satisfactory to all concerned. It is the desire of the immigration department here that as many as are fitted shall be retained in the Dominion and that all possible facilities shall be provided for the transportation of such as desire to go back to Japan or elsewhere. The majority are destitute and some are actually lacking suitable clothing. These will be cared for and in the meantime the transportation companies are evincing a spirit of humanity in conformity with that which won such encomiums for the Empress of Asia.

The problem is one of peculiar difficulty inasmuch as the refugees are landing without notice given and must be taken care of without previous preparation.

## VETERANS HONOR COLONEL COLES

Chosen Honorary President With Executive Powers in Association For Life.

## OFFICERS ELECTED

In recognition of his long services and worthy efforts on behalf of the

organization, Lieutenant-Colonel W. G. Coles, was elected honorary president of the G.W.V.A. with executive powers, for life, at the regular meeting held in the Duffield Block last night.

The veterans attempted to induce the colonel to accept the presidency another term, but he refused, owing to ill-health and business. Excepting one year, he has been president of the local branch of the G. W. V. A. since 1916.

Other officers elected by acclamation were: Harry Wray, president; T. Alken, 1st vice-president; W. Morgan, 2nd vice-president; T. Holmes, treasurer; George Turner, secretary. The new executive committee elected by acclamation is composed of A. E. Foster, D. Finlayson, H. Clements,

F. Bates, W. Noble, E. W. Menzie, T. Williamson, F. Wright and A. E. Case. Col. Coles will act with the executive in an advisory capacity. The executive committee will meet on the first and third Monday of every month.

The new house committee is composed of B. Lavender, T. Murphy, F. Tucker and H. Atkinson.

The veterans appointed a committee to work in conjunction with other organizations on the arrangements for holding the annual poppy day in London.

All the members present placed themselves on record as being in favor of the amalgamation of all veterans organizations in Canada. All of the 862 branches in Canada are said to favor the union. It is stated

Ontario is a certainty in this regard, and that meetings are being held in Western Canada to bring all war veterans in that part of the country together.

Great War Veterans in London are still homeless. A meeting of various organizations in the city is being called to arrange for the obtaining of permanent quarters. In the meantime rooms at 110½ Dundas street are being rented temporarily for meetings.

Monday evening a general meeting is being called and a social evening is promised all veterans who attend. The meeting is being held at the rooms rented at the corner of Dundas and Talbot streets.
