BLAZE SEEN 25 MILES

Victims Pray as Sacred Host Paraded Through Stricken Area.

Terrebonne, Que., Dec. 2 .- One hundred and seventy-five houses destroyed, 1,200 persons rendered homeless, and a million dollars' damage done, is the latest estimate of the losses sustained by the fire which wept a large section of this place last night.
