Chatham Board of Education Has Problem-Surplus

in Finances. Special to The Advertiser Chatham, Dec. 4 .-- No solution of the overcrowding conditions in the Collegiate Institute and the Central

school has been reached yet. At the meetings of the board of education tonight a report was presented by a special committee, named at a previous session, which pointed) out that the crowded conditions were worst in the two buildings referred to. It was suggested in the report that the Gray - Dort Club rooms might be purchased and used for classes from Queen Mary and Central schools; that industrial and domestic science classes might be taken from the Central and housed in a new building, which would have to be erected on the Central grounds; that commercial, industrial and domestic science classes might be removed from the Collegiate to another building; that the Collegiate building might be used for a public school, and a new combined collegiate and technical school erected or that a

new public school building might be ther discussed.
The financial report indicates that the board will likely have a surplus of \$24,000 this year. Chairman F. W. James announced that the Collegiate expenditures are about \$12,000 less than estimates, while the industrial classes have a margin of \$5,000 and the public schools a mar-
