William Taten Tilden II. king of the world's tennis players, has developed a case of artistic temperament that is not exceeded or even equalled in athletics anywhere today.

At St. Louis the other day, George M. Lott, jr., of Chicago, gave Tilden one of the hardest matches of his career and came near to wrest-

ing the crown from the titleholder The gallery, it is declared in detailed accounts of the game reaching here, was almost unanimously for Lott and showed its feeling by applauding every good shot the youngster made. Tilden didn't like this at all, and protested to the umpire, who on several occasions addressed the crowd, requesting the spectators to conform with the custom usual

to tennis matches by remaining quiet until the point had been won Several times Tilden made no effort to return Lott's stroke when the spectators applauded, and once he raised his arms, signalling for silence. Tilden, obviously angered, remarked, "Impossible to play before

This, however, was not the only display of temperament on the part of the champion during the match. During the crucial fifth set, when Lott was enjoying a slight lead and was about to begin a service, Tilden asked for new balls. Lott, however, objected, figuring that they would prove a disadvantage on his service.

Tilden insisted, and Lott replied, "Well, if that's the kind of a sport you are, you can have a whole box of them."

Tilden then refused to accept new balls, but asked for them at the beginning of his own service, and Lott tossed him four. When Tilden made his first request for new balls, the old balls had been in play only four or five games and were still in good condition.
