

## CARDS FROM CHIROPRACTORS ACCEPTED BY SCHOOL BOARD

Trustees Delighted With Co-operation of Parents in Matter of Medical Inspection of Pupils of the City Kindergarten Classes.

Medical examination of pupils in Grade 1 of the public schools will be proceeded with shortly if the board of education adopts the recommendation of the medical committee. The committee decided upon at a meeting held in Victoria hospital this morning in conjunction with the sub-committee of the Western Ontario academy of medicine.

The question of co-operating with the local board of health in connection with the inoculation of public school pupils with diphtheria toxoid, after written consent of the parents has been secured, was laid over by the committee for further consideration, though it was pointed out that the executive of the academy has approved the use of the toxoid as a protection against the disease.

Some discussion arose as to the four or five osteopaths and chiropractors, "irregulars" as they were called, who were included in the list of 91 city doctors, making the examination of the kindergarten pupils, the subject of the suits of which were considered by the committee.

Trustee Dr. J. T. Bowman introduced the question, "without prejudice," as he said of examinations being made by other than allopath doctors. Dr. Bowman cited one question on the examination card relative to the removal of tonsils, which he stated other than allopath doctors would not approve.

Dr. E. D. Busby pointed out that under the law, osteopaths and chiropractors are not "doctors," and added that the initial resolution covering the examination read quite plainly "by medical practitioners."

It was generally agreed that while the board undoubtedly has the right to select the cards of pupils examined by the osteopaths and chiropractors to one side and entitled also to recognize only those made by fully and legally qualified doctors, since only about six or ten children had been examined by these "irregulars," nothing should be done about it in case the whole principle should be endangered.

The committee was unanimous in its appreciation of the co-operation of the medical profession, and of the parents in having their children examined. Ad-

ministrator G. A. Wheable, B.A., reported that there had been only one definite refusal to have the medical examination made. In all 866 kindergarten pupils were examined, with the result that a total of 912 defects were found. It was stated by Dr. George Ramsay that there were "a goodly number of children with crooked feet, while there were not a few with multiple defects."

"Dr. Bowman, Trustee S. F. Law, and Dr. Busby, chairman of the follow-up system of re-examining next year the same pupils as were examined this year, arguing that results could then be shown of the examination, and the defects remedied at the same time keeping down the cost of the scheme."

Trustee Rev. R. D. Mess, chairman of the committee, and Trustee G. F. Cope, did Mr. Wheable and Dr. Ramsay, "the extension system" of examining pupils of the first grade, stressing the fact that to examine only the kindergarten pupils each year would take eight years before all the pupils in the public schools have been given the medical examination. They also pointed out that the school nurses can keep track of the pupils examined this year, and found to have defects and report whether these defects have been cured or not.

The Missing Link. Mr. Mess emphasized the fact that the medical examination was made in the first place, between the school nurses and the medical profession, and that having started out on that principle, the board should continue along the line until all the pupils in the public schools have been examined.

This latter view finally prevailed, and thus the medical recommendation to the board is that Grade 1 pupils should be examined as soon as possible, at the same time keeping pace with the scheme in examining boys and girls entering the kindergarten.

Discussing the board of health proposal regarding the diphtheria toxoid, Dr. E. J. H. Campbell and also Dr. Ramsay, endorsed the toxoid as a good thing and "advisable" to have the plan carried out. Trustee Mrs. J. A. Hunt was inclined to negative the plan, while Mr. Lawson was only too ready to acquiesce in the suggestion that the whole matter be laid over for future consideration.

Trustee Mrs. J. A. Rose was the only member of the medical committee of the board, or of the academy sub-committee, not present at the meeting.

## WENGE ALLEGES PARTY POLITICS

"Don't Be Swayed by Politicians," His Advice at Noon Meeting.

SPEAKS AT KELLOGG'S

We must get him out,' said the politician. 'Why?' he asked. 'He has done what we must get him out of the rejoinder. 'Oh, nothing, but don't you see that he is just getting himself in shape to run as member for London in the Ontario house, and that job has been promised to me by the party,' said the politician."

"Don't be swayed by the politicians," the mayor continued. "If they send a car for you, ride in it by all means, but vote according to your conscience when you get to the polls. It's a secret ballot. Not even the driver of the car can ask you how you are going to vote under penalty of a fine."

Believes in Impartiality. The mayor, who was accorded a rousing reception at two previous meetings at the McCormick Manufacturing Company's plant, appealed for support on his record during the past three years. He exhibited a list of meetings he had attended during the past year, which contained something like 800 entries. "I've been to everything that I was asked to attend, except meetings of the Ku Klux Klan, and I'd have gone to that too had I been invited, because I believe in being impartial," he said.

"The time he has spent in attending public functions as mayor of the city were compared with the salary he receives for his office. It would work out at about 7c an hour, he asserted. Questioned by one of the audience at McCormick's as to his stand on the street railway, he emphatically declared himself opposed to the city buying "this bunch of junk" at any price whatsoever. He was also opposed to having it taken over by the L. and P. S. Railway, which he declared had lost up to the end of this year \$478,000 besides \$193,000 which citizens have paid in excess fares through the failure of the road to inaugurate a 50-cent return fare to Port Stanley.

## WASTED HALF-MILLION CHARGE IS REITERATED BY CRONYN

Candidate For Alderman Denies He Is Seeking To Raise Issue of Responsibility, But Insists He Would Like To "Stop the Leak."

V. P. Cronyn, who has entered the aldermanic field in the municipal elections, with the avowed purpose of lowering through a reported waste of \$500,000 caused by inefficiency in the present form of civic management in the last three years, today reiterated his determination to pursue this quest if empowered by the electorate so to do.

Mayor Wenge some months ago, in an address before the Rotary club, raised the question of this waste, and announced intention of awakening a greater interest in municipal government.

"I was astounded by his worship's declaration," Mr. Cronyn explained today, "and largely as a result of it I determined to offer my services to the people of London to help to stop the leak."

"I notice that Mayor Wenge is quoted on Saturday as having said that the London might have saved this amount by the adoption of the city manager form of government."

"In my advertisement to the voters of London I did not forward a solution for this serious problem, but I did promise a vigorous, systematic and effective co-operation with the city manager form of government."

"That promise of co-operation goes for anyone, including Mayor Wenge, who comes forward with what promises to be the best solution. The mayor's suggestion of city manager system may be the only solution, but there may also be a reader one."

"Half a million dollars of tax money is a colossal amount to waste in three years, whether the waste occurs by reason of an antiquated system or any other cause. If it could have been saved, it would have been wasted. However, I am not blaming anyone or raising any issue as to responsibility. I am quite ready and positively determined to believe the mayor did the public a

service in making the fact known. If there was any, will not get the money back now. But intelligent action and whole-hearted co-operation on the part of the members of the 1926 council should produce some solution, and that constructive policy is what I offer the people who foot the bill. Such a loss means three mills on the tax rate, and is more than the whole cost of the police or fire department. Further, it equals the cost we are facing of the new city hall, of which we might be proud. That \$500,000 certainly is a matter of the first importance to every taxpayer."

Mr. Cronyn declared that while this item is one of the most important now before the city he is also keenly interested in instituting some far more rigorous and effective campaign for new industries than has been followed by London for some time.

"The annual statement of the Bank of Montreal issued a few days ago, states that business is distinctly on the upturn. He said, 'Every authority is now making the same forecast. I believe that London should jump into the field at the earliest moment and strike hard to get our share of American and other new business that will come to Canada with a fresh period of prosperity. That will do more to fill up empty houses, and to provide employment at good wages for our people, than any other measure within the power of the city. The old horse reunion doubtless has publicity possibilities, but is an incident to the general question of permanent industrial growth and steady employment."

## PRIDE IN FARMS URGED BY R. A. FINN

Agriculture Department Representative Gives Talk to Children of Trafalgar School.

Ontario has the largest production of agricultural products in the dominion, and the county of Middlesex ranks first in every form of agriculture, stated R. A. Finn, district representative of the department of agriculture for the city of London and the county of Middlesex, in addresses before the pupils of Trafalgar school this morning.

Upon agriculture depended life, he said. The industries of the city could only prosper to the extent to which the farmers prospered. He made a splendid comparison of the pioneer farmer and the modern farmer. In the olden days the farmer made his own tools and built his own houses, but today he bought his tools and had most of his buildings made by professional builders. This was the age of specialists, he said, and the farmer had to have that work done by others, because it did not pay him to do his own work—it was the age of specialists, and he was specializing in increased production.

Can Make Farmers Now. Farmers were born in the olden days. Now they could be made. It was a great improvement, he stated. ## AWAITS SENTENCE IN ASSAULT CASE

Thomas Hobbs Convicted of Committing Brutal Attack on Constable.

Convicted in police court this afternoon of assaulting Constable William Clipperton when the officer attempted to make an arrest a week ago, Thomas Hobbs, 18 years old, was remanded by Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon to be sentenced next Monday.

Charles Campbell, 20, arrested with Hobbs and facing the same charge, was remanded until tomorrow that medical evidence in his behalf might be presented. E. W. M. Flock, Campbell's counsel, told the court his client was subject to epileptic fits and it was during a violent seizure that he committed the assault.

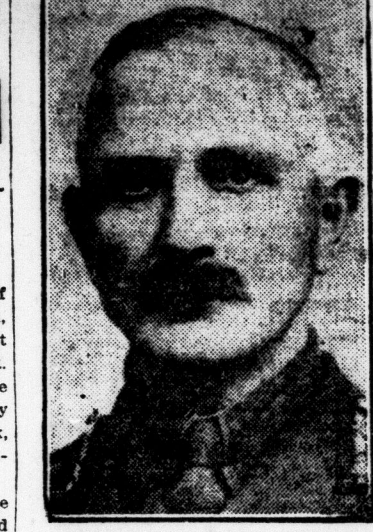
Constable Clipperton was attacked by Campbell when he attempted to place Hobbs under arrest on a drunk charge. When he accosted the two men one pulled the cape about his neck from behind.

Choked by the neck strap of the garment, the constable was thrown to the ground, and in that position was brutally kicked by one of the men, according to Clipperton's evidence.

Only after his face had been badly lacerated did he manage to get hold of his baton and with the weapon subdued both assailants. The officer's face was badly scarred and swollen. He suffered from blackened eyes and broken nose.

Upon their appearance in court last Monday, Hobbs and Campbell were remanded without bail. Through their counsel, Jared Vining and E. W. M. Flock, both pleaded guilty and elected summary trial before Mr. Graydon today.
