

Little Lessons In Golf

BY CHESTER G. HORTON. Nationally Known Golf

When you have taken your clubhead back with your left arm straight the back swing and have a look for yourself at the arm and wrist. Do that, so that you will understand how it works

If your left arm is nearly straightjust slightly curved—and the left wrist is in line between the shaft and your forearm and the ball, you have the "eight o'clock position." That position is correct.
