BATHING BEAUTIES AT GRAND PLEASE WITH CLEAN SHOW

Provide Real Treat With Excellent Comedy, Dancing and Singing.

CHORUS OUTSTANDING

Without fear of contradiction it may be said that the "Bathing Beauties," the Columbia offering at the Grand Opera House the first half of this week, is in a class by itself when it comes to clean and snappy amusement. The most careful and scrupulous of critics could not take offense at anything that has been spoken or done during the two hours and a half, while the pep and energy displayed by the principals and chorus was remarkable. They were on their toes all the time.

Many features combined to make the whole good, but the palm must go to the chorus, which is the best that has yet been here. The girls are all good looking, neat and smartly dressed. Their voices harmonize and they dance well. They have many opportunities of displaying their charm and ability, and in every case it means a change of costume. Of the principals, Jack Hunt and Clyde Bates lead in the race for honors. These two funsters furnish the ordinary comedy prevalent in burlesque, that of Hebrew types, and portray tramp characters that are well done. Their make-up is unique. Charles Markert sings and dances well, an encore being demanded. Alice Lawlor can dance, and possessing a pleasing and attractive personality, gets across well in all her numbers. Vinnie Phillips, a dancer of the strutting type, carries off several numbers well, her voice being resonant and heard all over the house. Dottie Leighton also scored in her offerings.

The real feature of the show, however, and one that nearly stopped the performance, was the dancing of Aaron Palmer and William Kelly, both colored. After their specialty offering the applause was long and sustained. The following number, "The Diving Duck," was well received. Dottie Leighton also scored in her offerings.

The costumes of both principals and chorus were clean and new, that is with the exception of Hunt and Bates, and were in the majority of cases, in the style of bathing suits. Fourteen changes of costume were noted, each one more striking than the last. The scenery also appeared to be new and bright, and while there were not many changes, suited all the show in every way.

RELIGIOUS COUNCIL TO END SESSION

London Body To Conclude Convention in First Presbyterian Church, Tuesday.

The fourth and last of the series of conventions being held in the First Presbyterian Church by the London Religious Education Council takes place today. It will be the adult and administration division, and should attract a large, if not larger, attendance than any of the others.

This session commences at 6 p.m. with a cafeteria supper for the sisters, superintendents, officers, Bible class teachers, and R. E. C. workers. The debate and discussion follow.

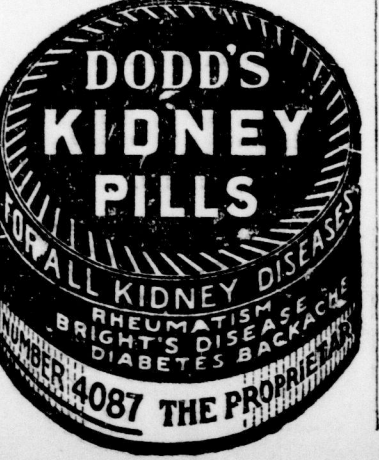
The evening session opens with a report of the year's work of the London council, and this will be followed by the election of officers.

PLANS MADE TO DRILL ALBERTA OIL FIELDS

British Petroleum, Limited, Will Start Six New Wells in Spring.

Victoria, B.C., Jan. 28.—Next spring a program of development will start in the Wainwright, Alberta, oil fields involving expenditure of several hundred thousand dollars and which will include the drilling of at least six new wells by British Petroleum, Limited, and laying of many miles of pipe lines, according to plans developed at a meeting of company officials here.



TECHNICAL MAY BECOME VOCATIONAL COLLEGIATE

School Board Favors Move To Relieve Present Congestion.

DEPARTMENT APPROVES

Dr. Merchant Will Visit London To Go Into Situation.

After twelve years' existence, London's Technical and Art School, one of the finest in the province, may be converted into a vocational collegiate, in an effort to relieve the secondary school accommodation problem without erecting a new building in London East, and a new collegiate in London South, where property is already owned by the board.

With this object in view a committee was appointed to investigate the feasibility of the plan and confer with a delegation from the department of education, which will be in London this week, and report back to the board of education.

This was the decision made at a special meeting of the board yesterday, when the report of the deputation that visited Premier Howard Ferguson and the department in Toronto Friday was received. The committee will consist of Chairman Bryden N. Campbell, Dr. A. J. Grant, Rev. Quintin Warner, A. N. Udy, Rev. Roy D. Mess, George Copeland, W. Manning and Arthur White.

The report of the deputation as read by Dr. Grant, was as follows: "Your deputation visited Toronto Friday and was received most cordially by Hon. G. Howard Ferguson as minister of education, and Dr. Merchant of the Ontario Department of Education, and the following facts were presented:

Carrying Out Policy. "The London board has been doing its utmost to carry out the policy of three collegiates as agreed upon by the department in November, 1920.

"1. The commercial department has been permanently placed at the Technical School.

"2. The Central Collegiate has been built.

"3. A site has been purchased for the London South Collegiate.

"One year ago the London Board of Education made a determined effort to procure a debenture issue to erect a collegiate in London East, but without success.

"Many members of the local board feel that a solution may be had by converting the present Technical School into a vocational collegiate similar to schools being operated so successfully in other cities in Ontario.

"Dr. Merchant was delegated to visit London and go into the entire situation."

Explains Situation. After reading the report Dr. Grant stated that the conversion of the Technical School into a vocational collegiate had been discussed informally by No. 3 committee, but that as the vocational advisory committee is interested primarily in the Technical School he thought that the board should adjourn and convene immediately as a joint meeting of the two committees to discuss the feasibility of converting the present Technical School into a vocational collegiate of sufficient capacity to accommodate commercial and technical work for London as well as academic collegiate work for the London East Collegiate unit.

Dr. Grant gave statistics showing the present crowded situation. He stated that the present Technical School was equally pressing in both the south and east, and that the old buildings now being used in the education of the future men and women were a disgrace to the city. "The conversion of the Technical School into a vocational collegiate would mean saving the building of an entire collegiate in London East at a cost of between \$250,000 and \$300,000. The only addition that would be needed being the building of straight classrooms.

"As a vocational collegiate we could at once take care of our 245 London East students now working under such difficulty in the old Princess Avenue School," he continued. "They would enjoy the best of modern facilities in a much better building than we can afford to build at present, if we are obliged to undertake the building of a new unit in London East."

Complete Reorganization. "This means a complete reorganization of the institution on the basis of a modern vocational college, incorporating the same academic standards as enjoyed by the best collegiate institutions in the province. The change would not in any way interfere with the splendid work now being done in the commercial and technical departments of the school.

"There is no possibility of such an economical solution of our difficulty in London South. We are faced there with the same pressing need of adequate accommodation, but it means a complete new school. The solution suggested for London East should make it possible for us to finance a school for London South."

"We have every reason to believe that the plan would commend itself to the city council and the citizens in general, thus providing an economical, permanent solution for the whole problem of secondary education, which has been a most vexatious problem in London for the past four or five years."

Before adjourning, the board passed a resolution of condolence to Trustee A. R. Cairncross on the death of his father, James A. Cairncross.

"No one wants to disparage technical education," he concluded, "and a complete and thorough investigation of all sides will be made."

"I cannot understand where you will get 300 more students in this school. When it was claimed a year ago it was too small, and an addition is only now completed," declared Trustee J. B. Wright.

Chairman Campbell replied that four classrooms available would take care of 180 students, and that a rearrangement of the adolescent classes would accommodate another 40 or 50.

Trustee Mrs. Rose asked whether it was the intention of the board to have children attend a school without either grounds, gymnasium or audi-

torium. She felt that if other schools had this, then all should.

Chairman Campbell again replied, stating that it was a matter for the future, as the people at present were not in a spending mood.

Matter of Time. Trustee Warner stated that these additions to the technical school were merely a matter of time, as the building was so constructed that they could be taken care of, and while Dr. Grant declared that the board was not anxious to compromise the students of London East in favor of London South, he stated that the comparative cost of a probable addition to the technical school together with a gymnasium, etc., and a new collegiate in the east end.

The answer again came from Chairman Campbell, who replied that a new school of twelve rooms would cost at least \$200,000, while an addition to the technical school of straight classrooms would average about \$10,000 per room. The gymnasium would cost about \$150,000. In addition to the cost of the new school the price of land in London East would be about \$50,000.

A. N. Udy, who stated that technical education was in its infancy, and that it would develop and grow faster in the future. He also said that the majority of homes in London East were those of artisans and mechanics, who wished their children to take technical courses rather than academics, and that it would not be long before the present Technical School would be made to the technical school for this purpose. He declared that he was not convinced that the suggested solution would be a permanent one.

Arthur White, an appointed member of the vocational advisory committee, wanted to know the difference between a vocational collegiate and a technical school, and whether it was not a fact that the only difference was that at the most, there were two subjects taught in a collegiate that were not on the curriculum of a technical school.

Teaching Courses. Replying, Principal Bell stated that the only difficulty would be in taking care of those students who wished to take teaching courses. Biology was the only subject not taught, although Greek and German were not on the list either. French and Latin are included.

"We have worked twenty years to get this school where it is," declared Mr. White, "and we do not want to lose out now. We get good grants from the government in respect of technical education, and if these were made to a vocational collegiate, none would be forthcoming. He declared that it would be a retrograde movement to change the school into a collegiate, stating that there was no reason why students could not matriculate from there just as well. It would be possible to add the missing course."

"We are teaching adults here," he continued, "and this should be stopped. There is a room used for teaching motor mechanics to adults at night, in which they may learn how to drive a car. This room is not used in the day."

Principal E. A. Miller stated that the idea had not originated with him. He felt the difficulty would be with the department and their attitude to placing teachers courses in a technical school. Students from London East wanted this course, as well as others.

Arthur Kennedy asked whether it would be in the form of a recommendation to the department as he did not think the board had the power to turn the building upside down by converting it.

J. Hussey expressed the opinion that in changing the name of the school, it would be slipping a cog. He thought that several pupils now taking academic courses wanted technical courses, and that the coordinating officer should be set to work along this line.

Dr. Grant replied that technical education would not be allowed to suffer. He declared that Principal Bell had been responsible for putting it on the sound footing it holds in the city.

Rev. Quintin Warner, concluding the discussion, said that the weak and the strong should be guided and the pupils distributed according to their requirements.

The joint committee meeting then adjourned and the board again assembled and appointed a committee to investigate the matter.

FIRE LOSS IS \$400 IN TANNERY BLAZE

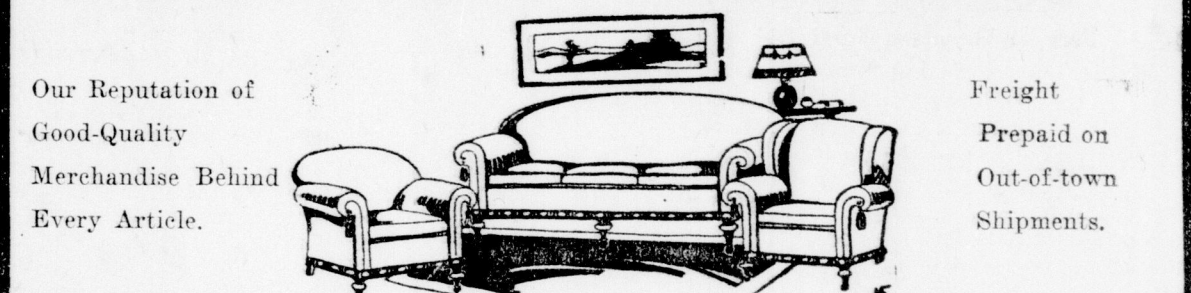

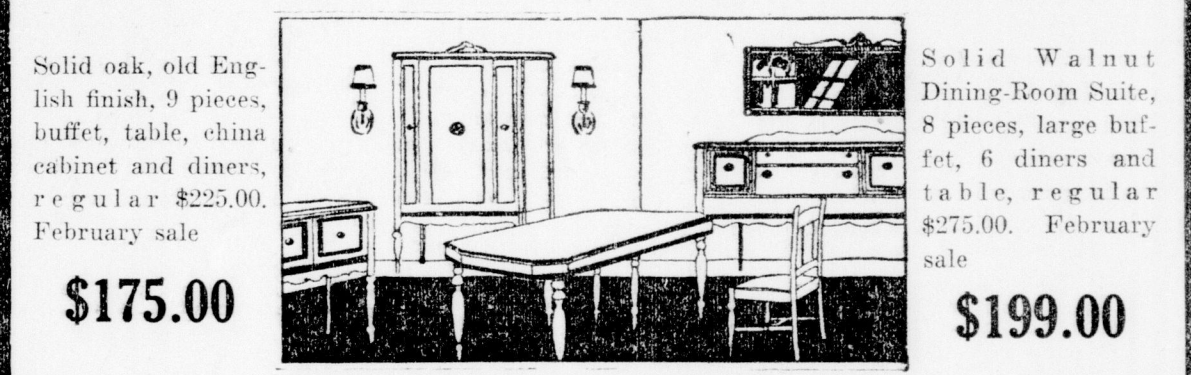

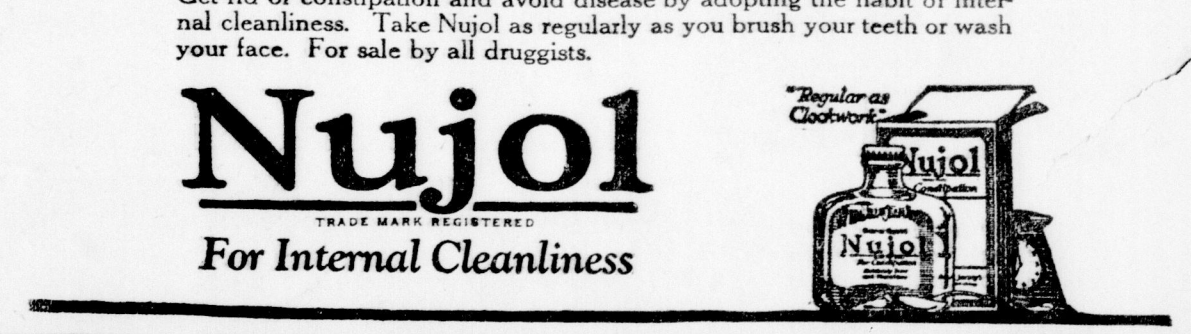
