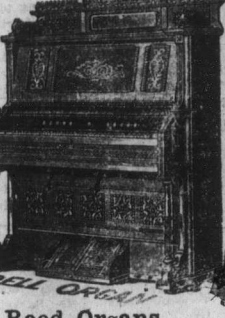

tigouche Boom Company, on behalf
of himself and others. Mr. Murray is
preparing a bill to be presented before
Chief Justice Boucher to request an in-
junction to prevent the boom company
from extending their work up river.
Several proprietors at the head and
owners of fishing privileges and water
rights are interested in the matter.
The boom company, it is stated, has
had its charter since 1879.
