BOARD OF TRADE FAVORS HYDRO

Petitions Government Not to Renew Lease on Grand Falls Property.

As a meeting of the Campbellton Board of Trade held in the Town Hall on the above date it was moved by H. B. Andrew and seconded by John Haquell that whereas the franchise or privilege granted to certain corporations of developing for their own benefit the great water power of the Grand Falls have lapsed or are shortly to expire by failure of such corporations to carry on any work towards the utilization of said water power.

And whereas it is the unanimous opinion of the Campbellton Board of Trade that the best interest of the people of this Province of New Brunswick would be served by the development of the aforesaid Water Powers by the government of said Province.

It is therefore resolved that this Campbellton Board of Trade petition the Government of this Province not to renew any of the franchises or privileges before or at present enjoyed by such corporations, but that the Government itself develop the said Water Powers if deemed advisable, and should it be deemed necessary that this Board appoint a delegate or delegates in conjunction with delegates from the County of Madawaska and the Town of Edmundston to interview and urge upon the government then necessary for developing the said water powers.

MUST ENFORCE PROHIBITION ACT

Premier Says He Has Told Chief Inspector to Use Every Method to Enforce Law.

Bathurst, N. B., Feb. 9.—"It is a fact that I have given personal instructions to the Chief Inspector in respect to the enforcement of the Prohibition Act; I have told Mr. Hawchorn that there must be a supreme effort put forth to enforce the Prohibition Act by every means that the law provides, and I suppose that is the reason for any instructions or warnings which the Chief Inspector has issued to his inspectors regarding the retail vendors throughout the province," said Hon. P. J. Veniot, premier, when his attention was drawn to reports of unusual activities upon the part of Prohibition enforcement officials in New Brunswick.

"What I have done is not to be taken as an admission that there has not been an honest effort in the past to enforce the Prohibition Act," continued the Premier, "but I have instructed the Chief Inspector that I want a supreme effort made to enforce the Act. Plans by investigations by which I shall cause to be made, it will be possible to tell whether the fault is with the law or with the officials whose duty it is to enforce the Prohibition Act, and upon the result of those investigations will depend what steps must be taken in the future in connection with the matter. If the law should prove ineffectual, and public sentiment is not sufficient behind the Act to make its thorough enforcement possible, then we will have to get something else."
