The death took place at her home in North Teteouche on Sunday night after an illness from pneumonia, of Mrs. Alex. Brown.

Mrs. Brown was one of the best known ladies in the county, having lived a number of years at the Mill on Teteouche River, and removed from there to her present residence a few years ago.

She is survived by her husband, three daughters, Mrs. Sayer of Lynn, Mass., and Misses Margaret and Isabelle at home; and two sons, Robert of Bathurst, and Arthur at home. She also leaves four sisters, Mrs. Jennie Hicks of Dunlop, Mrs. Elizabeth Chamberlain of Dunlop, Mrs. Dan. Currie of Campbellton and Miss Anna Moody of Bathurst. The funeral was held from her late residence yesterday afternoon at two o'clock to the Presbyterian cemetery here, and was very largely attended. Rev. Mr. Matthews conducted the services at the house and at the grave.

Mr. Stanislas Belliveau, foreman of the Bathurst Lumber Co's Shingle mill died on Monday after a long illness from pulmonary trouble. He leaves a widow and a small family of young children.
