There is a report that the influenza epidemic is disappearing.

Messrs. Murray & Barwick were yesterday appointed solicitors to the free library board.

Twenty-five watering carts will be put on the streets this season, being seven more than last year.

In Chambers yesterday Judge Boyd granted an order for the discharge of A. H. Dixon from insolvency.

A new thoroughfare has been opened up between Regent and Oak streets. It is called Clara street.

The newest thing in Toronto police headquarters is a counter in Sergeant Armstrong's office.

The Morrison gold and iron company has been organized with a capital of \$500,000. The head office will be in this city.

Only eight free railway passes have been issued by Mayor Howell since he assumed office. His wish is doing well.

The police were practising baseball in Queen's park yesterday. They are ready to seek the home of the victors at any time.

Quarter sessions and county court open today. There are seven cases on the original docket and twenty-five on the civil list.

The Toronto Bill association commenced their practice this afternoon at two. It will be continued Tuesdays and Saturdays during the season.

The freight sheds at the Queen's wharf which were used for freight of the Great Western division during the last six weeks were closed yesterday.

The managers of the Toronto bridge company state that they will have electric light going in two weeks. The works will then run night and day.
