Georgian Bay Scheme in Abeyance—

Passenger Stations Wanted at Bathurst

and Jarvis-Streets—No Report From

Fire Engine Experts—Another Light-

house at Eastern Gap.

Ald. Lamb presided at a special meet-

ing of the Board of Water and Sewerage

to receive a report of a special com-

mittee on the Georgian Bay Aqueduct

Company's offer to supply the

city with water. The sub-committee

was appointed about a week ago, and

had failed to obtain a quorum for a

meeting. Consequently there was no

report. The members present were:

Ald. Lamb, Leslie, Oliver, Crane, Hub-

bard, Bell, J. J. Graham and Sheppard.

Opposed to the Project as a Shape

Ald. Lamb: What is the business

for to-day?

Ald. Sheppard, chairman of the sub-

committee: We have no report to pre-

sent, because there was no quorum.

Ald. Leslie: What do you intend to

do, Ald. Lamb? Will you attend our

meeting for such a purpose. I am

against this aqueduct project. It is

not forward in the least whatever.

Ald. Leslie: What part of it do you

disapprove?

Ald. Lamb: I disapprove of the

whole thing. I always have done so

and I am as strongly

against it as ever.

Ald. Hubbard said his absence from

the sub-committee was because he had

not received due notice.

Ald. Crane protested that it was

understood in Council that the con-

sideration of the aqueduct scheme was

to be deferred until the next year. This

understanding had been set aside.

Ald. Lamb: I repeat I do not intend

to attend to a party to the scheme in any

way.

Ald. Leslie: You should have said

that when you were on the sub-
