

OBITUARY

DAN ECCLES
The funeral took place Monday afternoon of a well-known former resident of this village and of the township of Warwick, in the person of Daniel Eccles, who died suddenly at his home in Winnipeg on Wednesday, Sept. 23rd.
The late Daniel Eccles, who was in his 86th year, was born in Warwick township, his parents being the late Paule Eccles and Mrs. Eccles. The Dr. Eccles of London, was a brother. Fifty-four years ago he married Miss Charlotte A. Selley, daughter of the Rev. Mr. Selley, a Methodist minister of Quebec. He was a prominent member of the Congregational church, formerly Congregational, officiated, and Rev. H. V. Workman of St. Andrew's United church, assisted at the house. Interment took place in Bethel cemetery, Warwick township, beside the graves of his parents.
Survivors are the widow, one son, Stanley Eccles of Winnipeg; and two daughters, Mrs. Connors, of Madoc, and Mrs. A. Starks, of Port William, Ont.; two sisters, Mrs. Joshua Thomas of North Branch, Mich., and Mrs. Frank Kenward of Watford.

Death, the grim reaper, came suddenly to Mrs. David Minns on Monday while returning in a car from visiting friends in her former home of Utterson.
The late Mrs. Minns has been a resident of Bracebridge for over four years and in that time has stood very high in the estimation of all the people. A lady of marked ability, she took special interest in her church and all good work. She was President of Knox Presbyterian W.M.S., also a life member of that society and of the executive of Barrie Presbyterial. She will be very much missed in all church and social circles.
Mrs. Minns was born near Meaford daughter of Robert Clark and Elizabeth Joyce. When a young girl she taught school, being a most capable teacher. On Dec. 30th, 1885, she was united in marriage to Mr. David Minns, their first home being in Omeamee, Ont. They have since lived in Orillia, Gravenhurst, Utterson and Bracebridge, the present home of the family.
About twelve years ago her health became impaired and although she has been feeling fairly well at times, has never since been in good health. Being of an exceptionally bright and cheerful disposition those outside her home never knew how poorly she really was.
A true and faithful friend and neighbor, she leaves to mourn her great loss, her husband, three of a family, Mr. H. Joyce Minns and Miss Bessie Minns of Toronto, Mr. Bruce Minns, principal of Bracebridge Public School, also Clarence Minns, her grandson, who has lived in the home since the death of his mother when only two years old.
The sincerest sympathy of this community is extended to Mr. Minns and the members of the family in the great loss of this noble mother.
The funeral was held on Thursday afternoon at 2.30 p.m., from her late residence, James St. South, service being conducted by her late pastor, Rev. J. A. McConnell, interment taking place in the Church of England cemetery.

Ed. deGex Dies

Injured Spine in Fall From Hay Load; Lies in Strathroy Hospital Over a Year
Edward H. deGex, one of the most prominent residents of Metcalfe township, died in the Strathroy hospital after an illness of more than a year, during which he has been confined to the hospital.
In July, 1924, he fell from the top of a load of hay in his barn when a trip rope broke. He struck on the back of his head, and since then has been almost totally paralyzed. He seemed to be getting better until last Thursday, when he took a sinking spell, and death claimed him on Monday.
Born in Frome, Somerset, England in 1870, a son of the late Rev. Geo. deGex and Mrs. deGex, he came to Canada in 1885 and settled in Metcalfe township, on what is now known as Chantry Farm. He soon became known as a breeder of pure-bred stock and specialized in Clydesdale horses, Shorthorn cattle and Lincoln sheep. He had a nation-wide reputation as an authority in the breeding of these animals.
In 1893 he was married to Edith Mary Robson, eldest daughter of Geo. C. and Mrs. Robson of Denfield, who survives him, with one daughter, Mrs. (Col.) Chesman, of Windsor avenue, London. An only son, Frederick Geo. died in the military hospital in London in 1917.
The late Mr. deGex was actively interested in the work of St. Paul's Anglican church at Kerwood, and for years has served as a warden. In 1894 he served as president of the Strathroy Agricultural Society, an organization in which he has always taken a very active interest. He was prominent in politics as a supporter of the Conservative party.
