THE TOWN COUNCIL

The regular monthly meeting of the town council was held on Monday evening. Councillors DeWitt and Candler were absent.

R. Allen Crowe was present. He spoke regarding the wooden box to be placed in at the lake. He suggested that the six inch spikes be supplemented by several long bolts. He contended that the wooden box would not be satisfactory, and claimed that a box of concrete with walls eight inches thick, be substituted. It would take, at the most, four barrels of cement, and be understood from Mr. Beeler that if the town would furnish the cement, he would do the work.

The mayor asked if Mr. Beeler would be at any more expense, considering that the proposed concrete box was so much smaller than the hemlock box called for.

Mr. Crowe thought so. The mayor thought there was no doubt but the concrete box would be more lasting.

The clerk said there was no doubt in the matter. The specification especially said that anything omitted necessary to make a workmanlike job, should be supplied by the contractor.

On motion it was decided that Mr. Crowe should use his judgment in the construction of the box.

The mayor made an explanation re the water fund. He and the clerk had interviewed the manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia regarding the terms on which they could get a temporary loan of \$5000. The Union Bank had offered the lower loan at 5 per cent, and it was hoped to get a more favorable rate. The Bank of Nova Scotia declined to handle the loan, however, and the Union Bank was approached. This bank was anxious to handle the business at five per cent.

The old falls of J. D. Whitman and George Snow, 40-411 and 42 respectively, were again brought up. Councillors Chute and Harlow moved the bills be paid, and the motion passed unanimously.

The committee to report on the damage alleged to have been done to L. Miller's field reported that they could not see where any damage had been caused, and the report was adopted.

The Man Who Drinks

The manager of the Toronto street railway is of the opinion that the recent decrease in the number of accidents on his line is due to his action in discharging all motormen who were addicted to drink. Already this year twenty men have been permanently laid off for this reason, he says, and more are to follow.

The man who drinks has always been handicapped, but never so much as today. The positions of trust and responsibility open to him are continually growing fewer. In many lines of business he is practically black-listed; in all he is at a disadvantage compared with his temperate competitor. That the man who drinks, even in moderation, cannot be trusted at the front end of a trolley car, in the cab of an engine, in any position where constant alertness and clear-headedness is necessary is a conviction that is steadily growing. The day is coming when the flush of alcohol on a man's face or the smell of it on his breath, will be a certain bar to his worth as a book-keeper.

Under these conditions a man who, for the sake of so-called sociability or for the temporary exhilaration obtainable from strong drink, sacrifices money, time, health and clarity of brain, is a fool, and the community, widening public appreciation of this fact is doing more for the cause of temperance than could all the laws the legislatures could enact.

FOUR STELLARTON BOYS KILLED BY AN EXPLOSION

Stellarton, N. S., Sept. 3.—A terrible accident occurred here this afternoon, in which four boys, between the ages of twelve and sixteen years, lost their lives.

The lads who were killed were two sons of Neil Gunn, a son of Joseph Frew, and a son of Neil Patterson. They with another boy, by the name of Merritt, were playing ball near the west end of the town, near the Episcopal church. The ball entered the slope and they went in search of it.

HURLED 400 FEET.

After entering and proceeding a short distance down the slope one of the boys hit a switch. This ignited the gas in the mine, which has not been worked for a number of years, having been abandoned, and a terrific explosion ensued, which could be heard distinctly throughout the town.

Fewer than 400 feet, falling in the picnic grounds beside the High School, while one of the Gunn boys was thrown over the top of a grove of trees some distance away, and his body was terribly mangled.

ESCAPED WITH HIS LIFE.

Patterson and the other Gunn were still alive when found, but died shortly afterwards, while Merritt, who began to ascend the slope, when he heard the talk of lighting the match, escaped with his life, but sustained a broken arm and severe bruises. The bodies were brought to McQuarrie's undertaking rooms, where they were prepared for burial.

NORTHWEST PASSAGE ACCOMPLISHED

New York, Sept. 5.—A Christiana despatch to the Sun says the Norwegian Polar expedition on the ship Gipsa, has reached the Behring Strait, having thus accomplished the North West Passage.

RAILWAY PROSPECTS

Track-laying on the Halifax & South western was completed to Barrington Head some days since, and had the rails been on hand, the small gap between that place and the Passage would have been filled in ere this. As it is the whole line will be finished in a few days, and open for through traffic before winter sets in.

This road will furnish the one thing necessary to the progress of the towns and hamlets along the route, which have thus far had to depend on slow locomotion for the material blessings of modern life. The day has come when they must be up and doing, for a railway cannot of itself bring prosperity to any place. The people must put their shoulders to the wheels of local industry, and exploit every paying resource within their reach.

The new line, we are fully persuaded opens up some great prospects. It will aid the transportation of fish, the staple product of the South Shore, and stimulate the business generally. On the item of freight, to be carried on with much certainty, will be the much-needed timber of the shores of Queens and Lunenburg, and perhaps farther east. Of late, these fish are of regular yearly occurrence there, and this season have been very large. They were mostly routed by the Central and Dominion Atlantic to Yarmouth, a haul twice as long as by the shore line to Yarmouth and from there the distance by the same line to Shelburne. Either of these ports could do the transshipping of receipts by the new road at a great saving of time.

Rothschilds Won to Zionism.

New York, Aug. 25.—The Chronicle, a Hebrew weekly, has received information from London that the Rothschilds have joined the Jewish Territorial organization.

Only two months ago Lord Rothschild, together with many other leading Jews in England, issued a statement against the Zionist and the Territorialist movements, which provided for the establishment of Jews on their own land. The credit for winning over of the Rothschilds is given to Israel Zangwill, president of the Jewish Territorial organization.

Sarasnoto, Cal., Aug. 29.—For sending a large quantity of supplies valued at \$100000 from a Japanese trading house Hiroko, Canada, a Mexican, was arrested to serve the last five years of his life behind the bars at the State Prison.

ONE OF GREATEST BATTLES IN THE HISTORY OF RINGS

Goldfield, Nev., September 3.—The long-talked-of fight between Battling Nelson and "Joe" Gans for the lightweight championship, and a \$20,000 purse, Nelson to receive \$20,000, win or lose, Gans the balance, came off today according to schedule, and ended by Gans winning on a foul in the forty-third round. Both men fought desperately, and the battle will go down as one of the greatest of the ring.

The negro was able to inflict terrible punishment on the hero, but the latter stood it stoically. However, in one respect the go was by no means one-sided. Nelson also inflicted severe punishment on Gans. Gans was the favorite in the betting.

SUICIDE IN A HALIFAX HOTEL

Halifax, Sept. 5.—W. M. Archer, a native of Richmond, Virginia, blew his brains out yesterday morning in one of the city hotels where he had been stopping for the past six weeks. He was 38 years old, of good address, and made many friends here. He reported sometime ago that he had been robbed, and expressed regret that he had not been able to liquidate his obligations. The remains will be forwarded to Richmond by this morning's train. Archer had registered under another name. His father is wealthy.
