Death of Dr. L. G. DeBlois

The death of Dr. L. G. DeBlois occurred at his home in Bridgetown at 3.30 o'clock Friday morning after an illness, which had extended over a period of more than two years, during which by times, he was an intense sufferer. Dr. DeBlois was born in Halifax, June 4, 1838, and had there fore passed his 81st birthday. After receiving his earlier education in Halifax he graduated from Columbia University, New York, and was the last survivor of his class. For several years he practiced in Bear River, moving to Bridgetown 51 years ago. While health permitted he had a large and successful practice and was very popular among his patients. He married Miss Annabella Willett, of Granville Ferry, who predeceased him 18 years ago. They are survived by one daughter Mrs. H. B. Barrett, of Hingham, Mass., and one grand daughter, Mrs. Oscar Thorpe, of Washington, D. C. Dr. DeBlois was a member of the Episcopal Church and the Masonic order. The funeral took place Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock with interment at Granville Ferry. The funeral services were conducted by the Rev. Mr. Reeks, rector at Round Hill.
