MARK TWAIN'S DESCRIPTION OF HIS INVENTION:

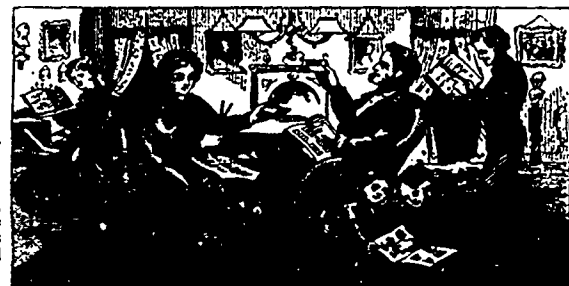
HARTFORD, Monday Evening.
