they hope to be able without any great difficulty to satisfy the payments yet re-maining to be made. In this connection, and contributing to this happy result, your Committee, while not overlooking the liberality of our own people, would make especial mention of the generosity of the Board of Missions of the Irish Presbyterian Church in increasing their grant from £50 to £150 stg. This increase was unsolicited on our part, and came to us unclogged by any conditions on theirs, except that a fair proportion should be expended in New Brunswick. We feel that their liberality descrees, as it will no doubt receive, some special action on the Synod's part. Nor can we pass on without recording our grateful sense of the services of the Rev. P. G. McGregor; who has conducted the correspondence with the Irish Board in reference to this matter.

It has been usual to furnish some statistics bearing upon the position of the Fund, and gathered from the Statistical Table.
