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THE EDUCATION OF THE YOUNG IN THE PRINCIPLES OF HYGIENE.*

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That the principles of cleanliness and purity should be early instilled into the minds of the young will be generally acknowledged. To discuss the teaching of Hygiene to the young, it will be necessary to consider what is included in the

term Hygiene, then how it is to be taught.

Under school age, the child's first ideas of morality, purity, modesty, and cleanliness must come from the parents. discussion here is almost necessarily limited to the schools as the channel through which the instruction is to reach the In the public schools of this Province, the subject designated "Physiology and Hygiene" was introduced as early as the first intermediate class, but is now limited to the senior grade, and an hour given to it per week.

Much diversity of opinion has arisen in the community as to the scope of this subject, and also as to the wisdom of introduc-

ing it at all into the school curriculum.
