ture of Italian Colonies. Because of this influence -- and its wer for good or bad -- we must now estimate carefully what we buld ask the United Nations to do -- and use it so that, even with its inted resources, it can serve the high purpose for which it was unded.

From what I have said you can judge that I do not think that United Nations is a perfect organization or cannot be improved. I do believe that the important work which the United Nations is ing even now should be recognized and encouraged. The success of United Nations depends upon the voluntary co-operation of the tions and upon the effective support through informed public opinion the peoples of the world. If I have done anything today to contbute to your understanding of the United Nations and your interest it, I shall consider that I have in some measure warranted the contidence in me you have shown by conferring on me an honorary degree.

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
