MULTICULTURALISM

MEASURES TO GIVE POLICY GREATER PRIORITY AND CREDIBILITY—REQUEST FOR STATEMENT

Mr. Lincoln M. Alexander (Hamilton West): Mr. Speaker, I have a question for the Prime Minister arising out of the travels of the Special Committee on Immigration. Is the Prime Minister aware of the disappointment and displeasure registered by many Canadians as the result of the downgrading of multiculturalism and, if so, what specific steps are planned to give this policy a greater priority and more credibility?

Right Hon. P. E. Trudeau (Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, the priority which the government attaches to the program of multiculturalism is very high indeed, and the actions of the government testify to that.

Mr. Alexander: In light of the fact that this policy was extremely important before the last election, following which it became less important, and in light of the fact that this policy is now tucked under the armpits of the Minister of Labour—

Mr. Alexander: —would the Prime Minister now give an undertaking that he will make a statement in the House regarding what multiculturalism means to the Government, why he found it necessary to remove from office the former minister of state in charge of multiculturalism, and why he finds something that was important in 1974 no longer important now? Would he make that statement in order that the views of the government, and particularly of the Prime Minister, of this country can be registered for the edification of the people?

Mr. Speaker: Order, please.

Mr. Alexander: I hope the Prime Minister will rise in his place and answer my question.

BILINGUALISM

SUGGESTED REVIEW OF METHODS OF ACHIEVING OBJECTIVE—GOVERNMENT CONCERN ABOUT COST-BENEFIT OF TECHNIQUES

Hon, Robert L. Stanfield (Leader of the Opposition): My question is directed to the right hon. Prime Minister and it arises out of a response given by the Secretary of State in which he said there was much more than costbenefit involved in the bilingual program. In view of the importance of public support for this program, and in view of the possible interpretation that could be put upon the minister's answer-it might be interpreted to mean that expense is no factor in connection with this program-I should like to ask the Prime Minister, in view of the comments made by the Commissioner of Official Languages, whether the government is in fact reviewing the present methods to ascertain that they are the most effective in achieving the government's aim with regard to bilingualism in the public service, and whether the Prime Minister could assure the House that the government is concerned about the cost benefit of the various techniques being used?

Right Hon. P. E. Trudeau (Prime Minister): Yes, Mr. Speaker, I can give the hon. gentleman that assurance. As a matter of fact, a cabinet committee is convened for tomorrow to deal with this very matter and to look into certain aspects of Commissioner Spicer's report. I did discuss the matter with Commissioner Spicer some time ago and I have had correspondence with him since. The matter will be dealt with in cabinet committee tomorrow.
