

MINING IN ONTARIO,

What the Sixth Annual Report of the Director of the Bureau of Mines Contains.

Director Blue of the Ontario Bureau of Mines got out his sixth annual report yesterday morning. It covers the year 1896, and partially the first three months of \$897, and is, therefore, more promptly issued by several months than former reports. everal months than former reports. The report, which is dated April, 1897.

The princess Mine.

Editor World: I don't want to get into a controversy over the Princess deal, but. In justice to the interest which your paper has always taken in mining matters that during the first three months of 1897 the receipts from the same sources were the receipts from The report, which is dated April, 1897.

The petroleum statistics do not show marked change from those of former years, but prices for crude have been well maintained. The re-opening of the Bothwell field during the year promises to add substantially to the output of the wells, but as far as exploration work has been carried on there it does not appear that the productive area of this once famous region is large. The borings on Pelee Island only serve to show that oil-bearing rock exists there; its area and richness remain to be proven. The gas fields of Essex and Welland maintain their output, more especially the former; but the bulk of the natural gas is taken for consumption by the cities of Detroit and Buffalo. The value of the petroleum produced was \$1,955,295 and of the natural gas \$276,710.

The small Industries.

Some smaller industries were started in the province during 1896, which are well deserving of mention, for they promise to become important. The blast furnace at Hamilton, which started up its first campaign early in the year, produced a total of 28,302 net tons of pig fron. A graphite mill erected at Ottawa for treating the ores from a large vein of the mineral discovered in Brougham Township has commerced to run under very favorable auspices and substantial orders for the refined graphite have been received from Germany. The works at Merritton for the manufacture of carbide of calcium have been successfully inaugurated, and their capacity has been gradually enlarged.

The company formed to manufacture peat fuel in the County of Welland has been employed during a portion of the year in the production of moss litter for the American markets under a contract for large quantities extending over a period of years, and the manager is sanguine that The Small Industries.
