PROTECTION, NOT BOUNTY.

Provincial Secretary Green and Other Western Government Officials in Toronto.

A delegation of offilials of the new British Columbian government are in Toront en route to Ottawa. In the party are Mr. Robt. F. Green, Provincial Secretary and Minister of Mines; Mr. Charles Wilson, president of the council and their secre ary; Mr. R. E. Gosnell, a well-known newspaper man. The purpose of the visit is to protest against the Dominion governrepeated legislation against undesirable imneigrants. It will stimulatt the industry some. What we want is protection. That is what we must have, too, in this direction. We are now in the position of no protection on things we produce, tho confronted by protected articles in everything we buy. This cuts both ways. We can't get protection for our lead this year, but we shall keep on until we do get it. Our caparity is from fifty to sixty thousand tons of lead annually. Canada's utilized supply to any is from fifteen to twenty thousand tons. This is all Mexican lead, smelted in the United States and shipped in bond. British Columbia would gladly forego this bounty for protection.

Would Duplicate Dingly Bill. Protection, Not Bounty, Wanted.

"What protection do we want? The same and the United States requires of our ad going in there now—one and one-half lead going in there now—one and one-half per cent. per pound. 


