

Tomorrow the magnificent new First Metholist Church will be dedicated to

The exterior needs little description It has been seen and admired by all It is rich, not gaudy. Though the pile is huge, its lines are graceful, and though the color is somber and uniform, there is a quiet splendor, and a suggestion of massive strength about the building far more impressive than if bedizened by architectural mony with its devout purpose. It looks like a house of worshp, and not

The interior is somewhat in contrast with the sober grandur of the outside walls. Within all is bright and heerful. The polished timbers glow in the sunlight, which pour through glass, prettily tinted, but mt in the least opaque like those cathedral windows richly dight, shedding a dim, religious light. There is not a shadowy corner in the whole church. The crystal dome overhead is a blaze of color and lets in a radiant flod.
