When meeting or overtaking other bicyclists on roads where it is impossible to see a long distance, or when reaching a steep descent, the rider is obliged to give frequent signals with his bell. Scorching is not permitted

#### THE STERNAMAN CASE.

Extradition Proceedings Continued -Medical Witnesses Testity.

Buffalo, Nov. 11.—Extradition proceedings in the case of Mrs. Olive Adell Sternaman, of this city, charged with poisoning her husband, George S. Sternaman, was resumed yesterday. A number of formal witnesses were heard, identifying the policies and other papers, and testifying to Sternaman's good health when examined for the insurance.

Mr. Thomas, attorney for the Canadian Government, attempted in his examination of these witnesses to show the fabrications resorted to by Mrs.

Sternaman in order to cover her alleged guilty deeds and obtain her husband's insurance. Mr. Thayer, her attorney, tried to prove the genuine-ness of the policies and the absurdity of the supposition that she entertained any schemes at the time of the death of her first and second husbands. Detective Murray, of Toronto, testi-fied that he was a duly authorized detective in the Sternaman case, and that he had obtained all the expert medical evidence read at the first ex-


Drs. W. C. Phelps and Edward L. Frost, who attended Sternaman and Mrs. Sternaman's first husband during their illness, testified to the condition of the man when they were called, etc. Dr. Frest said that in his opinion a man might suffer from chronic poisoning months after taking a dose of arsenic, and that death might come a month or more afterward from the same dose. This evidence, while interesting, is not relevant to the points at issue, and was not contradicted by the attorneys and the officials who were trying to get the extradition man while he resided at 27 Elsie Place, Buffalo. He first visited him on June 24. He urged Mrs. Sternaman to have her husband removed to a hos-pital, but she absolutely refused to do this. Dr. W. C. Phelps was called in consultation, and agreed with Dr. Frost in advising Sternaman's removal to a hospital. Sternaman, when he saw his wife objected to such a procedure, said that he would remain at home, where he could receive he attention. Dr. Frost treated Sterna-
