A LOCAL BUDGET

—The London Dental Society will hold their first annual banquet at the Teacup House on Friday evening next.

—A mad dog, which on Saturday night made things lively in South London, was shot by P. Connelly on Sunday morning in the northern part of the city.

—Charles Deleary, the Muncey Indian charged with stealing harness from a Dunwich township farmer, was yesterday remanded for another week by Judge R. F. Lacey.

—The Misses Penny, of Merlin, are visiting their brother, Mr. H. H. Penny, 661 Princess avenue, and will leave in a few days for Boston, Mass., where they intend to reside.

—Eighty feet of the new crib extension for the ship dock at Port Stanley was placed in position Sunday morning after a patient wait of more than a month for suitable weather.

—Rev. E. B. Smith, incumbent of Holmesville parish, was last week presented with a beautiful address, accompanied by a fur coat, bearskin robe, easy chair and horsewhip.

—Mr. James McDonald, of the Queen's Hotel, left the city yesterday morning for Belleville, to attend the funeral of his nephew, John McDonald, killed in the railway accident near Trenton.

—The anniversary entertainment of Hamilton Road Methodist Church was held on Monday evening, when a very enjoyable time was spent. After the opening exercises, addresses were delivered by Revs. Thos. Wilson and A. G. Harris, followed by songs rendered by H. R. McDonald and Mr. Williams.

—Lieut.-Col. Holmes, D. O. C., of this city, was a passenger on the C. P. R. train wrecked at Havelock Monday afternoon. He was on his way to Ottawa to attend the conference between Major-General Hutton and the district commanding officers, and was the only one of the gathering who appeared in civilian clothes, his baggage having been lost in the wreck.

—Among the awards at the New York horse show yesterday were the following: Class 102, heavy-weight green hunters—First prize, Burford, br. g., four years, Adam Beck, London, Ont. Class 107, for the best performance of hunters or jumpers, over six fences, two at five feet, two at five feet six inches, and two at six feet, carrying a minimum weight of 140 pounds—First prize, \$200, Fellowship, b. g., Mrs. Adam Beck, of London, Ont.

—A dispatch from Ypsilanti, Mich., of the 14th says: Mahlon B. McGregor, aged 66 years, died at his residence on Adams street at an early hour this morning, after an illness of more than a year's duration, caused by paralysis. Deceased was born in London, Ont., and had been a resident of Ypsilanti for the past six years. He was a member of the Masonic fraternity, and of the Order of Foresters. He leaves a widow and five sons, viz.: William R., of Ann Arbor; James E., of Chicago; the remains will be taken to Stratford, Ont., for burial.

—The Brantford Courier says: It is understood that Rev. W. J. Clark, of London, will receive a call to Zion Church, to succeed the late Rev. Dr. Cochran. The congregations are unanimous in the choice of Mr. Clark, and if he can be prevailed upon to accept he will undoubtedly receive the formal call. It is likely he will be privately interviewed in the meantime with a view to ascertaining whether he is inclined to accept or not. Mr. Clark has refused several flattering offers during the past year or two. Should the reverend gentleman express his willingness to accept, a congregational meeting will have to be held to make the call a formal one, and at the December meeting of the Paris presbytery the matter would have to come up and be forwarded to the London presbytery, and then to Mr. Clark personally. It would therefore be some time before any formal acceptance could be made known.

The chair was occupied by Mrs. Dickson, president of the Dundas Street Church auxiliary. There was a very large attendance of the representatives of the different auxiliaries and circles.

Rev. Mr. Ford conducted the opening devotional exercises. An address was then given by Mrs. Robert Greene, of West London, on "Mite Boxes," followed by an interesting paper on "Our Duty to the Heathen," by Miss Crozier. Reports were read from the following circles: First Methodist, Dundas Center, Wellington Street, Askin Street, West London, Centennial, Colborne, Lambeth, Rhondale, Arva and The Grove, and all showed increased funds, and also greater interest in the work.

Mrs. Gordon Wright gave a number of interesting incidents in connection with the recent board meeting held in Kingston. She also spoke of the death of Mrs. (Dr.) Roseburg, of Hamilton, and of the late Mr. W. W. Ross, husband of Mrs. Ross, president of the board.

Mrs. (Rev.) Ford introduced a resolution, seconded by Miss Crozier, to discontinue the quarterly meetings, and hold a convention once a year. The resolution carried unanimously.

The annual gathering will be held in Askin Street, the date to be fixed by the district organizers, Mrs. Evans.

Mrs. J. H. Tennant was called upon to speak on "The Blessing of Giving." Her remarks were listened to with deep interest.

Solos by Mrs. James and a recitation by Miss McEvoy were much appreciated.

A tea was served to the ladies at the conclusion of the meeting by the Dundas Street auxiliary.

In the evening a public meeting was held, with a large congregation present, when an interesting address was delivered by Rev. Joseph Edge on "The Model Member of a Woman's Missionary Society." Rev. J. V. Smith spoke briefly, congratulating the auxiliaries and circles for their success. Mrs. McMechan presented a resolution of condolence with Mrs. (Rev.) Chapman, in the death of her husband, who labored so many years in the Methodist Church. The resolution was carried, and a copy ordered to be forwarded to Mrs. Chapman. The choir of the church assisted in the musical portion of the service. Rev. Dr. Saunders presided.

THE AGREEMENT WAS ADOPTED

Hospital Question Now Left With the County.

City Makes Some Slight Amendments, but No Material Changes—The Mayor Greatly Disappointed for a Few Minutes.

The city council last night, besides discussing municipal reform, adopted, with slight amendment, the county's proposed agreement for the care of pauper patients in the Victoria Hospital. City Solicitor Meredith and City Auditor Jewell were present.

Ald. Carrothers asked if the city could take the \$15,000 from the county without first obtaining legislation.

It was nothing but a mortgage, said Ald. O'Meara.

The city solicitor said the question of providing the money without legislation was one for the county to consider, not the city. To accept the money in this way would be legal, though unusual. The county would no doubt ask for the ratification of the agreement by legislation, and the city's liability would then be established.

Mr. Jewell, in answer to Ald. Winnett, stated that the cost per patient per day last year was 65 cents under the present agreement, and he estimated the cost under the proposed agreement to be about 78 cents per day.

This estimate was based on last year's expenses, and although these would be increased per patient, in the new building, Mr. Jewell understood the trust recognized that they would have to increase the fees from paid patients, which would be an offset to the increased expense. So 78 cents would probably be the average to come.

There could be no doubt, said Ald. Greenless, the building would cost \$15,000 or \$20,000 to complete, and the city could not do better than accept the \$15,000.

On motion of Ald. McPhillips, the first clause that the county provide the city with \$15,000 at 3 1/2 per cent, was adopted on the following division.

Yeas—Ald. Taylor, Belton, McPhillips, Douglass, Jolly, Winnett, Graham, Hunt, Gerry and Greenless—10.

Nays—Ald. O'Meara, Carrothers, Cooper, Dreaney, Nutkins and McCullum—6.

At the city solicitor's suggestion, clause 3 was amended to simplify book-keeping, charging the 75 cents per day absolute, irrespective of trust fund accounts.

Ald. O'Meara wanted clause 4 to provide for the termination of the agreement at the expiration of two instead of five years, but the clause was adopted unchanged.

At Ald. Winnett's suggestion clause 5 was amended to make the termination of the agreement possible if the government grant be withdrawn in part, even.

The last clause provided that the expense of securing legislation should be borne jointly. The cost would be \$250 or \$300, in all, Mr. Meredith said.

Ald. Carrothers said it would be better to raise the whole amount needed—\$15,000 would not be enough—then they could get a premium.

Ald. Nutkins, seconded by Ald. Graham, moved the county pay the whole cost. Lost.

The clause was also defeated by a tie vote.

"Rather than see the whole agreement defeated for this little matter, I would pay the city's share myself," said the mayor.

Ald. Greenless said the council had swallowed the camel and was straining at the gnat.

Ald. Graham would change his vote to year sooner than block the agreement. He had voted against the clause because he thought the county should pay.

Ald. Jolly moved that the matter be left to the joint committees to arrange. The mayor ruled that a two-thirds vote was not required and the motion carried 10 to 6.

HAD HIS SKULL FRACTURED

Moore Farmer Kicked in the Head by a Horse—Child Burned to Death.

Brigden, Nov. 16.—Thomas Duncan, a farmer living two miles northwest of here, on the sixth line of Moore, went out to do his stable work at noon on Monday. As he was passing a usual in returning, his wife went to see what was delaying him, and found him lying under one of the horses' feet unconscious, having been kicked in the head, badly fracturing the skull, and receiving other serious injuries. Dr. Fisher, of this place, assisted by Dr. Wilkinson, did what they could to relieve the unfortunate man's sufferings. He now lies in a very critical condition. Duncan is about 40 years of age, and has a wife and young family.

Montreal, Nov. 16.—Lauda Gohier, a 5-year-old child, residing with its parents at 107 Beaubien street, was burned to death on Saturday. Her clothes caught fire from some burning paper.

STEAMER SUNK.

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 16.—The steamer Centennial, from Hilo, reports that the steamer Columbia, bound from Honolulu to this port, sank in the harbor of Hilo on Nov. 2. The Columbia opened her seams when about 400 miles off the Hawaiian coast, and immediately put back to Hilo. She had a number of passengers on board, but there were no casualties.
