

To say that the reforms require "further legislation," and that therefore they cannot be brought about until Parliament meets is on the face of it to say that many things done by the Govern-ment for the past few years have been grossly unconstitutional. There is nothing under the sun which the Govern-ment has desired to do since the war commenced which it has not found the war measures act wide enough to cover.


First reports of the explosion said a number of lives had been lost but at laylight it was believed there was no oss of life, and that only two men had been injured.


