Eastern States Are Snowed-
In—New York Has
the Blues.

TORONTO, Jan. 28.—Toronto was again in the grip of a blizzard today. Late on Sunday night a light snow began to fall. In the early morning the wind freshened, and by daybreak the snow was swirling everywhere. The temperature was low, but the storm was not so severe as that of a few weeks ago. The atmosphere was damp, and this made the weather a little more raw, but the temperature was not so low. Trains, street cars and delivery wagons were delayed, but for the most part services of a kind were kept up. There was plenty of milk in Toronto for today's demands and though there may be some difficulty tomorrow, in filling orders the milk companies anticipate less trouble than they experienced two weeks ago.

Railways Demoralized.
The Toronto street car service was hindered and all sections suffered. As usual the service at the city limits, both east and west, was erratic. Service on suburban lines was pretty well demoralized.

The great steam railroads suffered the most. A number of services being cancelled on both the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific lines. Some trains were more than ten hours overdue. Canadian Pacific Montreal train, which should arrive at 9:30 a.m. did not reach Toronto until nearly 7 o'clock in the evening. The Grand Trunk 3:58 p.m. train from Chicago did not arrive until after 10 o'clock at night, and the Winnipeg train was easily five hours overdue.

London Train Cancelled.
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Blizzard in Belleville.
BELLEVILLE, Jan. 28.—A blizzard struck this city and vicinity today and in consequence the railways are tied up. Trains arrived here hours behind time, and all roads leading to the city are badly blocked. Added to this state of affairs is the fact that coal is scarce here.

Ottawa Trains Stopped.
OTTAWA, Jan. 28.—The outgoing night trains on the Canadian Pacific and Canadian Northern Railways were cancelled, and all freight service is suspended. The street railway managed to keep an infrequent service going. Four below was the warmest today, and the mercury was at 18 below early tonight.

Cold, Coalless Day.
NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—With snow falling intermittently, the harbor choked with ice, freight traffic virtually at a standstill, coal receipts less than they have been several days, and the business life of the city suspended, there was little of the holiday spirit in New York on the snow-bound Monday. Although it was one of the gloomiest days of a gloomy winter, there was a note of cheer where the boards were packed at afternoon and evening performances.

The reduction of the fuel administration were generally observed. The exceptions were reported to United States district attorneys, and it was intimated prosecutions would follow.

Should Not Require Order-in-
Council to Stiffen Borden's
Word of Honor.

LAME EXCUSE OFFERED

Premier Says Further Legisla-
tion Is Needed to Reform
Civil Service.

OTTAWA, Jan. 28.—The promises made by the new Borden Government prior to the election were written on sand. Their good intentions, as expressed to the electorate in manifesto and proclamation before polling day, have gone toward providing further patronage for a place already said to be well paved with gold.

Sir Robert Borden has been preaching civil service reform since 1908. After the election of 1911 he brought out at a large expense a civil service expert, in the person of Sir George Murray, Sir George recommended important practical reforms. But fatal weakness lay in the fact that the Government was not to be set off, and the Government's record from that time forward on the matter of civil service reform has been stained with party patronage, extravagance and inefficiency not paralleled by that of any other administration.

"Union" was formed, and it was announced that at last reform of the public service was to be brought about. Patronage was to be abolished; the civil service was to be brought under the civil commission, and in the future appointments were to be made on merit.

Requires Legislation.
Now the prime minister announces, as a statement issued tonight, that after endless conferences it has been found that "further legislation" is required before the question can be brought about. "The whole question," he says, "involves considerable difficulty and requires very careful consideration." And yet the prime minister has been "carefully considering" ever since 1908.

To say that the reforms require "further legislation" is and that therefore they cannot be brought about until Parliament meets, is on the face of it to say that many things done by the Government for the past few years have been grossly unconstitutional. There is nothing under the sun which the Government has desired to do since the war measures act was enough to cover.

Reform Not Desired.
The trouble is that civil service reform is not one of the things which the Government "desires" to bring about. It has shelved it. It was able to override the act by providing several new jobs for those who had to be rewarded. The total hostile aircraft destroyed since the end of November, when our machines commenced operations, are 37 enemy machines shot down and two brought down out of control; four balloons were burned; and five of our machines are missing."

ACTIONS END FAVORABLY.
ROME, Jan. 28.—The war office communication issued this evening says: "There have been patrol encounters which were favorable to us in the Val d'Asti valley. There was a successful action by our artillery against enemy positions between the Frangia valley and the Breda canal. Lively aerial activity has taken place on the whole of the front."

**UNITED STATES
TO HAVE ARMY
1,500,000 MEN
IN FRENCH LINE**

Half Million Will Be "Over
There" in Short Time,
Says Baker.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—America will have an army of half a million men in France early this year, with a million more trained and equipped ready to follow as quickly as ships can be provided to carry them—and the outlook for ships is not unpromising.

Secretary of War Baker gave this information to the nation and to the world in a statement before the Senate military committee, baring much that until now has been carefully guarded.
