The sack will look well in silk, cashmere, fiannel, or fiannelette, and the cap is suitable for lawn, silk or "all-over" embroidery. For the dress of flouncing, it will require 1% yards of 36-inch material, with 1½ yards of plain material for yoke and sleeves. stand over night. In the morning drain, then add to 2 quarts vinegar, 1 pound brown sugar and I package mixed, whole spices from which the peppers are removed. The spices should be tied in cheesecloth bags and removed before canning. Cook the piccalilli slowly until very tender.

Sweet Green Tomato Pickles—Seven pounds tomatoes sliced, 3 pounds brown sugar, 1 quart vinegar, 1 table-spoon each of cloves allspice and chnamon. Boil until syrup is as thick as molasses, keeping tomatoes in all the time. Slice the tomatoes over night, with a slight sprinkling of salt. In the morning drain all the liquor off, and weigh the tomatoes.

Chow-Chow (uncooked)—One head cabbage, 1-2 peck green tomatoes, 6 large green peppers, 3 onlens, 1 ounce whole black peppers, 1 ounce mustard-seed, vinegar. Cleanse everything thoroughly and remove the seeds from the green peppers. Chop all fine, salt well, and let stand over night. In the morning drain well and add all the spices. Cover with cold vinegar and seal in glass-topped pint glass jars.

Chow-Chow (cooked)—Three quarts cucumbers peeled and cut fine, one quart onions chopped, 2 quarts small whole onions 2 quarts cauliflower cut fine, 5 green peppers chopped. Put in crock, cover with hot brine and let stand over night. Drain and add seven cups granulated sugar, one-half gallon cider vinegar, 3 tablespoons mustard seed, 2 tablespoons celery seed. Let come to a boil; make a paste of two-thirds cup flour, one-quarter pound mustard, one-half ounce turmerle. Mix with cold vinegar and stir in slowly. Stir quickly and let boil for a few minutes.


